Popular Merchants Here for 55 Years Harold, Laura Wiles Retiring Today

Merchants in Acton for the past 55 years, Harold and Laura Wiles, have sold their Mill St. business and will enjoy retirement after serving the public since 1909.
Harold worked two years for Readmore and Company Limited and left in favor of a grocery store and ice cream parlor, then owned and operated by Miss Laura Ryder (Mrs. Robert Elgie). He and his sister recall many happy incidents at the first store located where the Bank of Nova Scotia now stands. At that time patrons wishing ice cream were served on hot days on the spacious lawn outside.
Moved in 1911
In 1911, they moved from this location to the present store at 18 Mill St. E. They not only operated a business but moved from the family home on Church St. to live at the rear of the business.
The year following their move the couple began serving meals and expanding the business. They continued serving meals until 1942, at which time the dining area was renovated for more spacious living quarters for the couple.
Many Changes
Both recall many of the former business people who were prominent 55 years ago are now deceased. They have seen many changes in the Mill St. business section during their stay in business.
One of the many foremost in Mr. Wiles' mind is the inauguration of the Toronto-Kitchener-London Bus Service through Acton. In 1927, the first bus rolled through town to a stop at his store, then the official bus stop just as it is today. The vehicle was given an official welcome by George Hynds, reeve at the time, and the late H. P. Moore, publisher of the Acton Free Press, and many other citizens and businessmen.
The bus service extended between Toronto, Kitchener and London and was known as the T.K.L. Bus Service, named after the route it followed.
No Emergency?
Harold well remembers the first trip the bus made in the new service. The vehicle was equipped with mechanical emergency brakes. The first time the driver applied the emergency, it tore the rear-end out of the bus. After this the bus went without emergency brakes for a number of years.
Following the T.K.L. was the "Arrow" Bus Lines. They continued in operation from 1929 to 1936, when the present Gray Coach Lines bought the business. Both Laura and Harold are considered to be the longest time agents for Gray Coach still in business.
Pop in Wagon
One of their suppliers for soft drinks was Rheinhart Company in Guelph, who are still one of the main suppliers to this day. The couple recalls when Mr. Rheinhart made the trip to Acton with a horse and wagon to

deliver pop. He has since died but the business is carried on in the family.
Quite noticeable to the brother and sister are the rises in prices. "Some commodities have even doubled in price," says Harold.
Will be Missed
The familiar couple could be seen daily in their store and will be missed by many patrons and residents of town. Harold always had a cheery grin and a wide wave for friends passing by and was found in his favorite perch at the front of the store where he served his tobacco and magazine customers.
The building occupied by the business was originally built by a Dr. Garvin around 1839, which he used as a drug store with a consulting room at the back.
Later Dr. Morrow followed in the same profession and then Dr. Forster of Stratford. John Secord used the building after this for a hardware store and later it was converted for use as a barber shop.
Thomas Agnew and George Stovell conducted a boot and shoe business there before moving to Guelph. The building has seen many occupants but none with a record of service such as Laura and Harold Wiles.
The new proprietor, Leonard Adams, took possession of the business today.
Although the couple will be leaving the business, they will still remain in town to greet former customers and friends. For a while they will continue to
