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Spilled Naptha Gas to Blame For Fire at H. K. Porter Plant

Spilled naphtha gasoline was blamed for a fire at the H. K. Porter plant on Mason Boulevard when the sprinkler system alarm began to ring around 4:45 a.m. Friday morning.

When firefighters arrived with two trucks, smoke had filled the interior of the plant and water was gushing from the sprinkler system at one end of the building where naphtha gas was being used. The sprinklers extinguished the blaze prior to the arrival of the fire department.

A night shift employee told fire chief Mick Holmes naphtha gas spilled from a tray he was carrying and burst into flames on touching the floor of the cording room. Within seconds flames roared through the tower looming above the cording room destroying contents. A 15 gallon drum of naphtha gas was stored in the cording room with an additional 50 drums outside the building.

This was the second run for firefighters within 12 hours Thursday evening before 7 p.m. they answered a call to Beardmore tannery to investigate the source of smoke in the outside department. When no sign of a blaze could be found it was assumed that the smoke had been caused by a tow motor which had been used earlier in the night.

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Thanks to Mohawk Township Taxes Down

Most Nassagaweya ratepayers received some welcome news this week, as township council set the mill rates for tax levies in 1964. Due to increased township commercial assessment — principally the Ontario Jockey Club's Mohawk Raceway near Campbellville — all rates went down, with the exception of the police village of Eden Mills.

General rates are 50.63 residential and farm (down 2.34 mills) and 56.25 commercial (down 6.92) in the Acton high school area; and 45.12 residential and commercial (down 6.05 mills) and 50.16 commercial (down 6.92 mills) in the Milton high school area.

Separate Areas Rates vary for those sections including the police villages of Campbellville and Eden Mills, and the S.S. 6 (Christie) school area.

Township clerk Don H. McMillan reported Mohawk Raceway is assessed for nearly one-quarter of the entire township assessment. The Jockey Club's tax bill this year nears \$50,000. Last year the Jockey Club paid only a partial levy covering just a portion of the year's operation, which had to be counted as a supplement to levy and distributed between council and its appointed boards and commissions on 1964 is the first year in which the Raceway taxes make any noticeable difference in the ordinary township taxpayer's rate.
