40 Years Ago

1,700 Orangemen Participate In Celebration March to Park

The Free Press of 40 years ago — July 17, 1924 — reports the crowds and excitement in Acton when the last Orange Walk was held here.

"Saturday was indeed a glorious twelfth in Acton. The weather was ideal for the grand celebration staged by the local Orange Order. Thirty-six lodges were represented in the parade, four brass bands, five pipe bands, three pipe bands and a Boy Scout bugle band provided music for the celebration.

"The parade started to form up at one o'clock in the school grounds, but it was after two o'clock before it could be formed and move over the Guelph Street over to Mill Street. It followed down Mill Street to Main Street, over to Church Street, from Church Street it proceeded by way of Guelph and Queen Streets to Young Street, and along Young Street to Mill Street and then to the Park.

"The two oldest Orangemen in the big parade were pioneers of Esquesing township, Messrs. William Hampshire of the Scotch Block, aged 90 years, and William Edge, now living at Waterdown, aged 95 years. These two

old gentlemen enjoyed a few hours together in reviewing the events of the former days, when the Glorious 12th was locally celebrated, before electric lights, concrete walks and motor cars came into use.

"Arriving at the park, a programme was given in front of a specially constructed platform. "Excellent accommodation was provided for the visitors by the churches and private citizens adding to restaurant and hotel accommodation of the town and serving meals. Between 1400 and 1700 walked in the parade, and a very conservative estimate placed the crowd at between 5,000 and 6,000 on the grounds, while thousands more lined the streets, and did not attend at the Park."
