Scenic Sites in Credit Watershed to be Marked

Many people would prefer to stay off the highways when out for a drive and if we could supply equipment they would stop and really look at some of the more beautiful areas of our valley. Credit Valley Conservancy Authority Chairman R. K. McMillan said at a recent meeting. He was referring to a suggestion that the CVCA supply picnic tables and waste disposal cans at picturesque or historic sites throughout the watershed.

Each member of the Authority was asked to submit the location of at least one spot in his municipality. Arrangements for the servicing of this equipment would be made with the municipality involved.

The Authority passed a resolution to seek Provincial Government approval to undertake conservation measures on a section of Fletcher's Creek in Brampton.

Murky Pool
Deputy-reeve William Hunter and Councilman John Powers of Georgetown Council appeared before the meeting with separate requests for consideration. Mr. Hunter remarked on the problem of the swimming pool at Terra Cotta Conservation Area becoming turbid when crowded. He enquired whether consideration could not be given to partially cementing the bottom of the pool. The members decided that this should be studied by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and a report made and forwarded to Georgetown Council.

Mr. Powers asked that consideration be given to establishing a conservation area in Georgetown. Alex MacLaren and G. A. Blackwell, Georgetown representatives on the CVCA, and Wilfred Leslie of Esqueting Township were appointed a committee to investigate the possibility of a conservation area in the town.

R. F. Hardy, Hornby, was appointed Chairman of the Historical Records Advisory Board, replacing A. M. Greenaway who resigned to accept the chairmanship of the Public Relations Advisory Board. Mr. Hardy, a retired lawyer, is Oakville's representative on the Authority. The members endorsed a request of the Peel Historical Society that a collection box be placed in the Belfountain Museum. Many visitors, the Society stated, expressed a desire to help and this would allow those who wished to contribute. The Authority anticipated that those in charge of the display would be responsible.

1965 Budget
The staff was directed to prepare, after consultation with the various advisory board chairmen, a schedule of work to be initiated or continued in 1965. Chairmen were asked to keep in mind that schemes for the coming year should be submitted with priorities which would permit acceptance or postponement, if necessary, to maintain the levy. This budget will be presented to the Department of Energy and Resources Management in August for its approval.

Chairman J. W. Pawley reported that, following a meeting at Belfountain, it was felt that the wading pool there did not have sufficient flow of water to keep it clean. It was recommended that the pool be filled with sand and a wading area for small children be provided upstream.

General Superintendent N. J. McMahon advised the Board that there was a danger of children slipping into the pool at Terra Cotta Conservation Area where the bank is protected with cement slabs. The Board recommended that a woven wire fence be installed on this bank.

Public Relations
Plans for cataloguing 35 mm slides already on file and augmenting them with more taken by members and staff were presented by Chairman A. M. Greenaway. Mr. Greenaway said that these slides and speakers could then be made available to anyone interested in the various phases of conservation. All new conservation projects of the CVCA would be filmed from the beginning.

Arrangements were made to have folders printed illustrating the extensive conservation areas within the jurisdiction of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority. It was suggested that many people who come to Terra Cotta Conservation Area especially do not know that there is any more than they can see from the parking area. This area alone contains 31 acres of nature trail, lakes, camping area and beautiful scenery as well as the swimming pool and picnic area close to the gate.

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Paint by Night Lines on Street

Motorists and pedestrians got a surprise Tuesday evening after dark when workmen moved equipment into town to mark white parking lines and cross walk lines on Mill and Main Streets.

A mobile portable spray machine made the lines. Flashing blue lights on trucks warned motorists of the operation. In some instances traffic was rerouted while work was being done. Quite a crowd gathered to watch.
