

R. A. McDonald Buried Former Area Resident

Funeral service was held on Saturday, July 4, at 3 p.m. in the Invermay United Church for Robert Alexander McDonald of Invermay, Saskatchewan, whose passing occurred June 30 following a month's illness. Death occurred in the Invermay Hospital.

Mr. McDonald was an early resident of the Invermay district, living there for 50 years. He was much interested in the community's progress.

Born in Esquimaux Township on June 8, 1885, Mr. McDonald went west in 1904, railroading in Manitoba and Alberta as a fireman. He will be recalled by older residents of the area, although he left as a young man. He later took up farming.

He was married to Mary Elizabeth MacArthur at Crystal City, Manitoba, on November 29, 1910. Mrs. McDonald survives him.

Well Known
Mr. McDonald was well known in Invermay, active in sports, especially baseball, curling and hockey; former president of the Invermay Rural Telephone Company; member of the Board of Trade, of the Masonic Order, and of the Presbyterian Church.

In addition to his widow, he leaves two sons, Gilbert A. and John G.; grandchildren, David, Donald and Shelley Lynn of Invermay; and a sister, Mrs. J. W. Seward of White Rock, B.C. A brother, John, predeceased him in 1940.
