Dr. Harley Reports to Halton On 26th Parliament's Progress

In a letter to his constituents this week, Halton M.P. Dr. Harry Harley reviews progress that the 26th Parliament has made since beginning its second session.

He first calls for a "streamlining" of Parliamentary procedure to alleviate a slow-down in passage of legislation. Dr. Harley also points out that:

- In education, measures have been taken to encourage students to remain at school and complete their education. Monthly \$10 youth allowances for these students 16 to 18 years, and a student loan act enabling secondary students to borrow up to \$1,000 for five years interest-free until six months after graduation, are also helping students remain in school.

- All provinces have approved the Canadian Pension Plan in principle and more progress on the Plan is expected in the near future.

- National Housing Act has been amended to provide for urban renewal measures. Farm Credit and Export Credit acts have been given more funds so that the farmer can get better loans and credits for expanding his business.

Troops In Cyprus

- The Government has sent Canadian troops under the UN flag to guarantee peace on Cyprus, and has approved of a single Chief of Staff of the three armed services as a step towards integration of the three branches.

- The Columbian River Treaty has been passed, and a 12-mile fishing zone has been approved to protect Canadian fishermen.
