The Council of the Corporation of the Township of Massagaweya intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board for an order under Section 63 of the Ontario Municipal Board Act to dispense with the assent of the electors to construct a new Municipal Administration Building at a total estimated cost of Thirty-Nine Thousand, Nine Hundred Dollars (\$39,900.00).

2. Application will also be made to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval under Section 64 of the Ontario Municipal Board Act to finance Eighteen Thousand, One Hundred and Seventy-Six Dollars (\$18,176.00) of the total estimated cost of the above mentioned project by a loan from the Municipal Works Assistance Program, repayable over a term not exceeding five years.

**3. Any receipt of the Township**

may, within twenty-two days after the first publication of this notice, send by post prepaid to the Clerk of the Corporation of the Township of Massagaweya, at the address given below, a notice in writing, stating their objection to this application and their grounds of such objection.

4. The Ontario Municipal Board may order pursuant to the Statute, that the assent of the electors shall not be required for the said project and may approve of the proposed financing of the said project, but before doing so, it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.

Thomas Arthur Evans, 66, the brother of Percy Evans of Acton and formerly an official of the Canadian Association of Broadcasters died Monday, August 24th, 1964.

**BUS ROUTES Acton District High School**

Students and parents living in ESQUESING AND MASSAGAWEYA TOWNSHIPS are asked to please note times and routes travelled by school buses.

Beginning Tuesday, September 8, school buses will leave Acton at 7:35 a.m. and return to the school with students at 8:45 a.m. These times have been arranged for the first week on a trial basis. In the event routes have to be altered, students will be notified Friday. At present, times for specific stops cannot be determined.

**ROUTE (1):** South from Acton on the 4th line of Esquesing to Limehouse sideroad, east to 5th line, north to Townline, east to 6th line, south to Limehouse sideroad, east to 7th line and north to Ballinfad, east to 10th line and reverse to Ballinfad, south on 7th line to No. 7 Highway, west to 4th line, north to town line, west to 3rd line, south to school.

**ROUTE (2):** North on 2nd line to town line and reverse to Acton, then west from Acton to 6th line of Nassagaweya, south on 6th line to No. 20 sideroad, east to Townline, south on Townline to 15 Sideroad, east on 15 sideroad to 2nd line (No. 25 Hwy.) at Speyside, north on 25 Hwy. to 22 sideroad, east on 22 sideroad to 3rd line (at Quarry), return to 22 sideroad and Hwy 25, north on 25 Hwy. to 25 sideroad, west to 1st line, east to Acton via Mill St. West.

**ROUTE (3):** West on No. 7 Hwy. to 4th line of Nassagaweya, south to No. 25 sideroad, west to 3rd line, north on 3rd line to No. 7 Hwy., west on No. 7 Hwy. to 1st line west of Eden Mills, south on 1st line to 25 sideroad, east on 25 sideroad to 3rd line, south on 3rd line to 20 sideroad, east on 20 sideroad to 5th line, south on 5th line to 15 sideroad, east on 15 sideroad to Speyside, north on No. 25 Hwy. to high school.
