

HARLEY...to HALTON

Since our last column, most of the time of Parliament has been devoted to the flag issue. It is expected now that the pattern for each week is now set as follows: Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, the flag debate; Friday, continuous sitting from 10:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. will be devoted to estimates of a government department (except from 5 to 6 p.m. for private members' bills).

Last Friday was devoted to the Department of Citizenship and Immigration and war partially completed. It is likely this Friday will see the Department of Labor discussed.

Discuss Business
On Tuesday, the five party leaders met again to discuss the business of the House of Commons. This was arranged as the previous meeting of the leaders, despite what the Leader of the Opposition has said.

If the government does not have a meeting, then the government is accused of "ramming this down our throats"; when a meeting is agreed to, then the government "is not showing leadership." It appears one cannot do anything without criticism. As far as this meeting was concerned, it was adjourned until Thursday for reconsideration of any proposals made.

Consider Amendments
The forthcoming Federal-Provincial Conference will consider how we can amend our constitution so that Canada will be completely governed by Canadians. At the present time, amendments to the British North America Act must be requested by Canada to the British Parliament.

A suitable formula must be worked out with the provinces—the last time this was attempted, Quebec and Saskatchewan would not agree. Parliament requires unanimous consent of the provincial governments.

Four Independence
All parties are in favor of bringing full independence and power to Canada, and the provincial governments have as yet been unable to agree on a suitable formula. It is hoped that this conference at Charlottetown will bring unanimous opinions to bear, so that the Canadian parliament will be able to make full and complete decisions for Canadians without recourse to London's Westminster.

The Minister of Citizenship and Immigration has outlined a program for encouraging skilled persons to immigrate to Canada. There is a genuine need for skilled individuals in this country. This would provide a stimulus to the economy. The government should endeavor, through adequate promotion and recruitment, to bring to Canada the highly skilled on a substantial scale.

Take Steps
The following steps have accordingly been taken:

- (1) An advisory committee to plan long term programs to assess immigrant needs of Canada and absorption of immigrants;
- (2) Better classification of personnel abroad;
- (3) Increased promotion of Canada, particularly in Europe;
- (4) Re-organization of Immigration Department;
- (5) Attractive remodeling, adequately representative of Canada, of Canadian offices abroad.

Dept. Announces Hunting Seasons

The 1964-65 seasons and bag and possession limits for Ontario game species have been decided by the Department of Lands and Forests and those applying to main species occurring in Halton County have been released by Ted Achert, Halton County Conservation Officer.

Generally the new seasons for Halton are the same as last year with only slight variations in the opening and closing dates. Rabbits and squirrels are expected to be plentiful in most sections of the County. Pheasants, although abundant below Hwy. 5 where they may not be hunted, are scarce in the remainder of the County. Fox, although not plentiful, are present while ruffed grouse are fairly abundant in certain areas, he said.

The 1964-65 seasons and possession limits for the more popular game animals and birds in Halton County are as follows:
Pheasants: — may be hunted in the year 1964 between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. from the 21st day of October to the 7th day of November, both dates inclusive.

No person shall take in one day more than three pheasants, not more than one of which shall be a female pheasant.
Rabbits: — may be hunted or trapped from the 21st day of October 1964 to the 28th day of February, 1965 both dates inclusive.

No person shall hunt more than six cottontail rabbits in one day.
Fox: — may be hunted or trapped from the 1st day of October 1964 to the 30th day of September 1965, both dates inclusive. (No closed seasons)
Squirrel: — (black grey or fox) may be hunted or trapped from the 3rd day of October to the 15th day of December, both dates inclusive, in the year 1964.

No person shall hunt more than an aggregate number of ruffed squirrels in a day, or possess more than an aggregate number of ten squirrels at one time.

Ruffed Grouse: — may be hunted in the year 1964 from the 3rd day of October to the 15th day of December, both dates inclusive.

No person shall take in one day an aggregate number of ruffed grouse and spruce grouse exceeding five, and no person shall

have in his possession at any one time an aggregate number of ruffed grouse exceeding fifteen. (In the absence of spruce grouse in Halton County, this bag and possession limit would apply to ruffed grouse.)

A complete summary of Ontario hunting regulations giving seasons and bag and possession limits for all parts of the province may be obtained from any district office of the Department if the sportsman is unable to obtain one locally.

Township Licence
Hunters are reminded in addition to a resident's hunting licence, a special township licence is required to hunt pheasants in townships of the province. This special licence is required for all townships of Halton County and for most townships in the immediate area. To avoid difficulties in the field, hunters are urged to know regulations governing game, guns and licences and to be familiar with the boundaries of the area in which a licence is valid.

Under the present licensing system an applicant must submit his expired licence in order to receive a renewal for the current season. In the event that the expired licence has been lost, the applicant must fill out and sign an affidavit stating when his last previous licence was held.

Any person of fifteen years of age or over wishing to purchase a resident's hunting licence for the first time, must first pass the hunter safety training course sponsored by the Department of Lands and Forests. Starting this fall in Halton County, instructors have decided to give this safety course regularly at fixed times each week. These times will vary from one area to another within the County. In past years classes were held in a given area only when sufficient students were enrolled to warrant holding a class.

In this area classes will be held on the third Friday each month beginning in September, at the home of instructor Dan Kidd, R.R. 2, Rockwood. Eligible persons wishing to enroll to take the course should contact Instructor Kidd by phoning 854-2562, Campbellville.
