Last Term for Seven Schools Eramosa Central is Underway

The new central school in Eramosa township, now under construction, is expected to be ready for occupancy by the end of the year. It contains seven classrooms, and when it opens, seven one-room schools will be closed.

The school includes a gym and a forum. The central school is located above No. 24 highway, north of 20 sidewalk on the fifth line.

Preparations are made for 650 students in Eramosa schools.

One Change Only one change will be made in school accommodations for the Eramosa schools in September. The Board has decided that grade 4 will be transported from No. 4 school to No. 3. Otherwise the same arrangements as last term will prevail.

The following arrangements will be in effect: Grades 1 to 3 from the former No. 5 school go to No. 4; Grades 6, 7 and 8 from No. 5 and No. 4 go to No. 4; Grades 1, 2, 3 and 4 from No. 4 go to No. 3; Grades 7 and 8 from Nos. 3, 6 and 10 go to No. 2; Grades 1, 2 and 3 from No. 7 go to No. 2; Grades 4, 5 and 6 from No. 2 go to No. 7; Grades 1 to 6 from former No. 1 go to No. 9; Grades 7 and 8 from Nos. 7 and 8 go to No. 9; Grades 7 and 8 from former No. 1 go to No. 11.

The same bus routes will be in effect as for the last term.

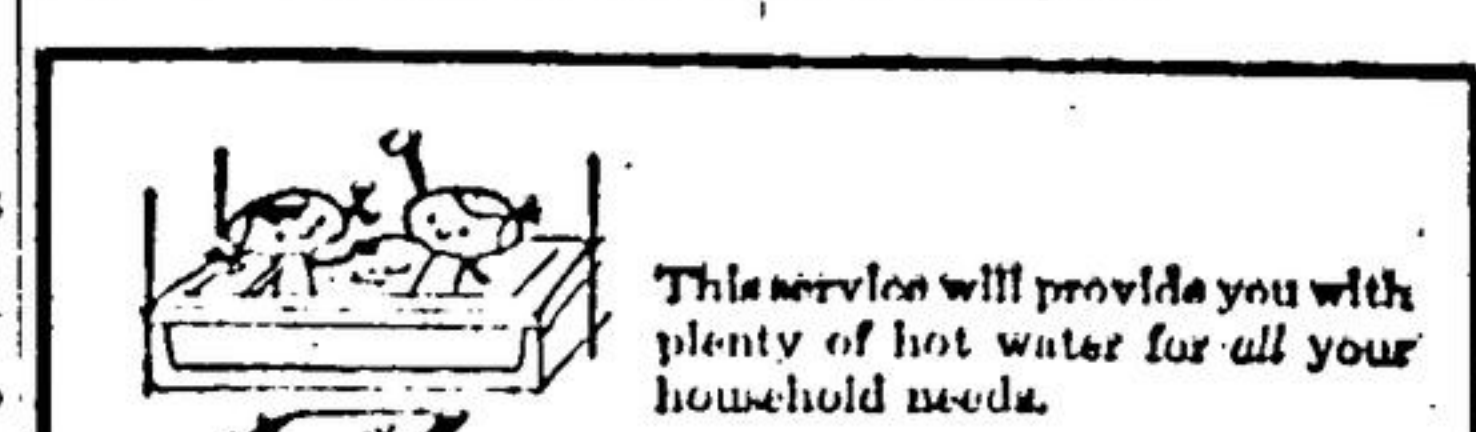

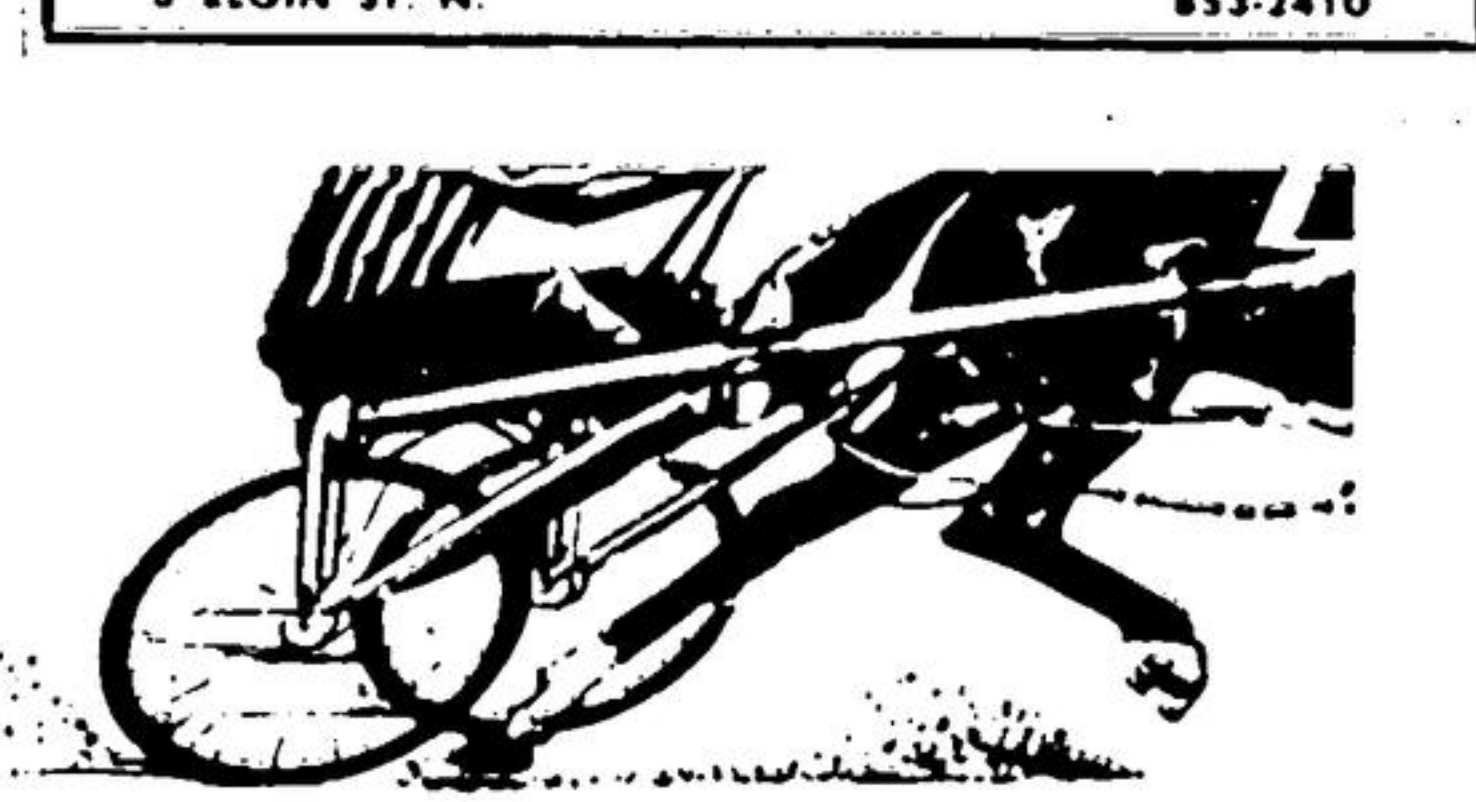

KEEP ALERT For children walking to school on the country roads.

NO (TRUCK) PASSING

YAILGATERS TRESPASS on the protective space behind other cars by following too closely. They caused over 7,000 accidents in Ontario last year because they didn't leave a safe stopping distance between cars.

Safe stopping distance is at least one car length between your car and the one ahead for every 10 miles of speed. At 60 miles an hour you should be six car lengths behind the car in front of you.

If a tailgater is following you too closely, here's a tip from the Ontario Safety League. Slow down a bit to leave more space between your car and the one ahead. With extra stopping room in front, you're less likely to have to come to a quick stop... and not so likely to be rear-ended by the tailgater.
