Stone School

The Stone school in the Robert Little school grounds enters into the picture in a new way with the building of the high school addition. Availability of four uncompleted rooms makes use of it this term by high school students unnecessary. It had been used by some grades and commuting teachers for the past two years.

Various proposals have been discussed for the building, which will probably be renovated to some extent. It could be used for overflow classes from both public schools. Each year, more enter kindergarten, than graduate, and the future need for additional is evident. Both schools are nicely filled now but kindergarten enrollment is high.

It's expected a library class room will be located there.

Another intention is to create, for the first time in Acton, an opportunity class for slow learners of both public schools. There is already a qualified teacher on the staff. High school problem of alternative accommodation if the addition wasn't ready prevented any decision to begin the class this fall, but it may begin at Christmas. Other schools this size have the valuable auxiliary classes and the inspector recommends them.

 Pre-registration of newly arrived pupils at public schools this afternoon and Friday will give principals a more accurate count of expected enrollment Tuesday.

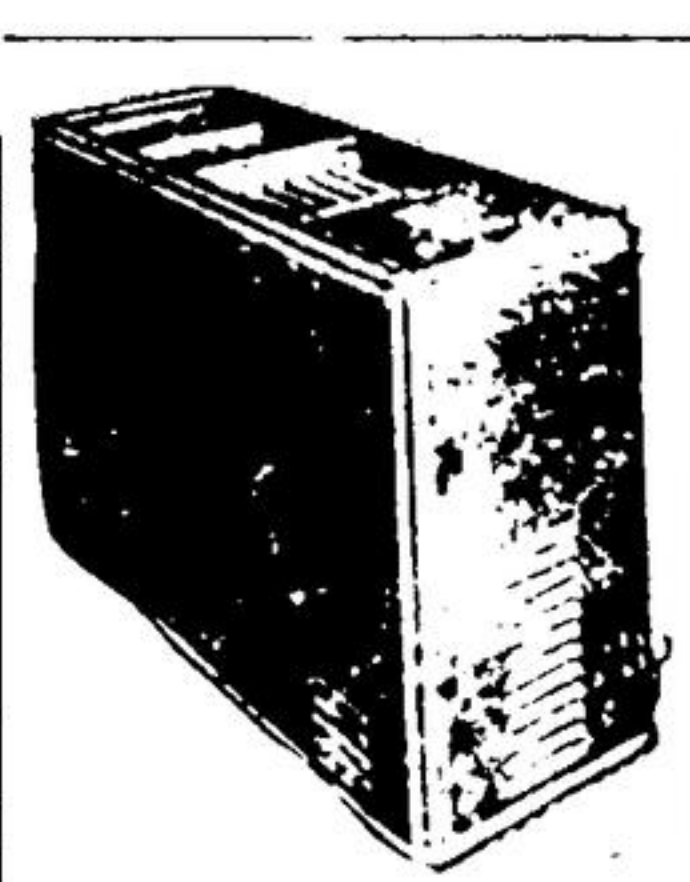

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Halton, Peel Trust Co. Opens Branch in Milton

Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Co. will open its seventh office in Milton early in October. General Manager O. E. Manning announced this week.

"We're optimistic about Milton and the surrounding area," Mr. Manning noted as he pointed out the company left the business in north Halton justified the new branch.

pages of \$1,075,118 in 1955 have grown to \$26,267,329. Mr. Manning points out that of that amount, as mortgage more than \$20,000,000 has been loaned with in the country to contribute to the development.
