Halton, Peel Trust Co. Opens Branch in Milton

Halton and Peel Trust and Savings Co. will open its seventh office in Milton early in October. General Manager O. E. Manning announced this week.

"We're optimistic about Milton and the surrounding area," Mr. Manning noted as he pointed out the company will keep the business in north Halton justified the new branch.

The company will occupy recently constructed quarters at the corner of Main and Charles St. in the heart of the downtown area. Complete services, including a savings department, investment department, mortgage loaning, pensions, estates and trusts will be operated.

The fire was discovered by one of the night shift workers who sounded the alarm before almost being overcome with smoke. Damage was contained to the wall as well as smoke damage throughout the department.


