The members of the Electoral College will meet in their several state capitals on December 14, 1964, to cast their ballots for President and Vice President. On January 6, 1965, the 538 electoral ballots will be counted before the new Congress, and, in compliance with the Constitution, the candidate who receives a simple majority will be legally elected President of the United States of America.

On Inauguration Day, two weeks later, the man chosen, in effect, if indirectly, by the people of the United States in a year-long series of traditional and legal procedures, will be invested with the powers, responsibilities and heavy burdens of one of the most exacting offices in the modern world.
