On January 6, 1965, the 538 Electoral ballots will be counted before the new Congress and, in compliance with the Constitution, the candidate who receives a simple majority will be legally elected President of the United States of America.

On Inauguration Day, two weeks later, the man chosen, in effect, if indirectly, by the people of the United States in a year-long sequence of traditional and legal procedures, will be invested with the powers, responsibilities and beavy burdens of one of the most exacting offices in the mod-
