**Forest Fire Destruction Up**  
 Fire destruction in Canada's forests to the end of July greatly exceeded the losses recorded for the corresponding period last year.

Forest areas burned were estimated at 1,586,000 acres at the end of July, as a result of 5,526 fires, according to statistics released by the Federal Department of Forestry. At the same date last year, 368,000 acres of forest land had been damaged in 5,197 fires.

**Hot Figures**  
 The department issued the following figures for the current season:  
 June — estimated areas burned, 266,000 acres in 1,295 fires, including 32,000 acres in 49 fires in the Yukon and Northwest.

### Judge Antique Cars at Kelso

The Historical Automobile Society of Canada held a special public judging competition at the Halton County Museum grounds at Kelso on Sunday afternoon with a crowd of over 500 attending. The antiques moved from the Steam-Era in Milton Fair grounds for their Sunday program, as the fair grounds were closed to the public.

In all, nearly 60 cars were lined up in their respective classes, and visitors had a busy day looking them over. The judges looked them over carefully too, and awarded prize trophies to the owners of the seven cars they felt had been best restored to their original condition.

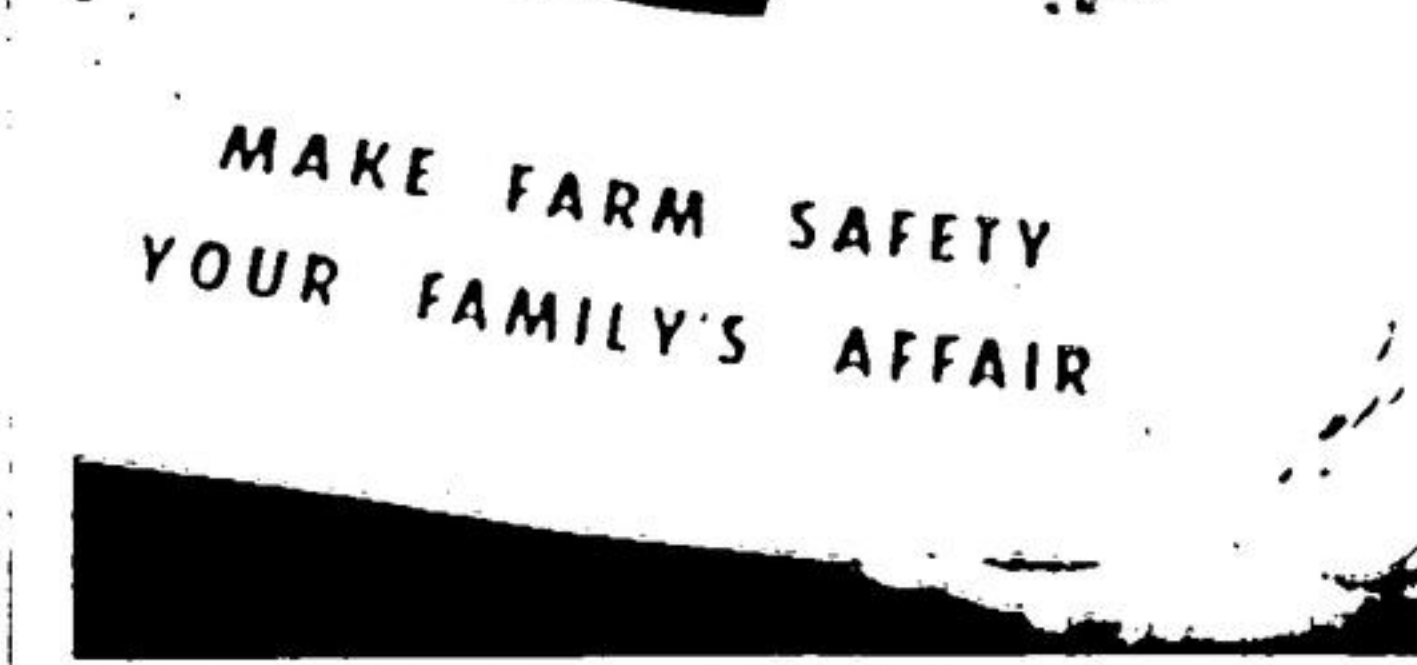
Gordon Smith, president of both H.A.S.C. and the Steam and Antique Preservers Association, presided over the presentation of prizes. He said each club member who exhibited a car in the program will receive a special certificate of achievement. Sunday's was the group's first judging contest, he said, and more are planned soon.

Top points of the day went to John Pratt of Oshawa, with 96 points for restoring his 1907 Ford. It won the class for cars dating prior to and including 1915. Goldfish Jim Sharp's 1915 model won the brass front Ford class, with 93 points. John Hogg of London was awarded 94 points for his 1921 Ford that won the class for Fords 1916 to 1927. A 1914 Model "A" Ford received 93 points to win the "A" class for Roy Ottaway of Dunville, and 95 points were given to Bill Saunders of Burlington for his 1925 Chev in the 1916 to 1927 class.

A "special interest" class was held for 1928 to 1935 cars, and Joe Patchett's 1929 Whippet was the winner with 91 points. He lives at London. The final contest was for restoration of classic cars, 1928 to 1942, and Steve Elliott of Ayr won with a 1930 Packard with 90 points.

Commenting on the awards, the president told a story which shows the manner in which these antique car enthusiasts take their hobby seriously. It seems in one class, the judges were stymied with a points tie on two cars. Two new judges were named to break the tie, and they ended up with a tie too! The tie was finally broken when one judge found a speck of rust behind the bumper on one of the cars, and first prize went to the owner of the other car.

Before the day ended, all the cars were lined up for a photograph to record the occasion.
