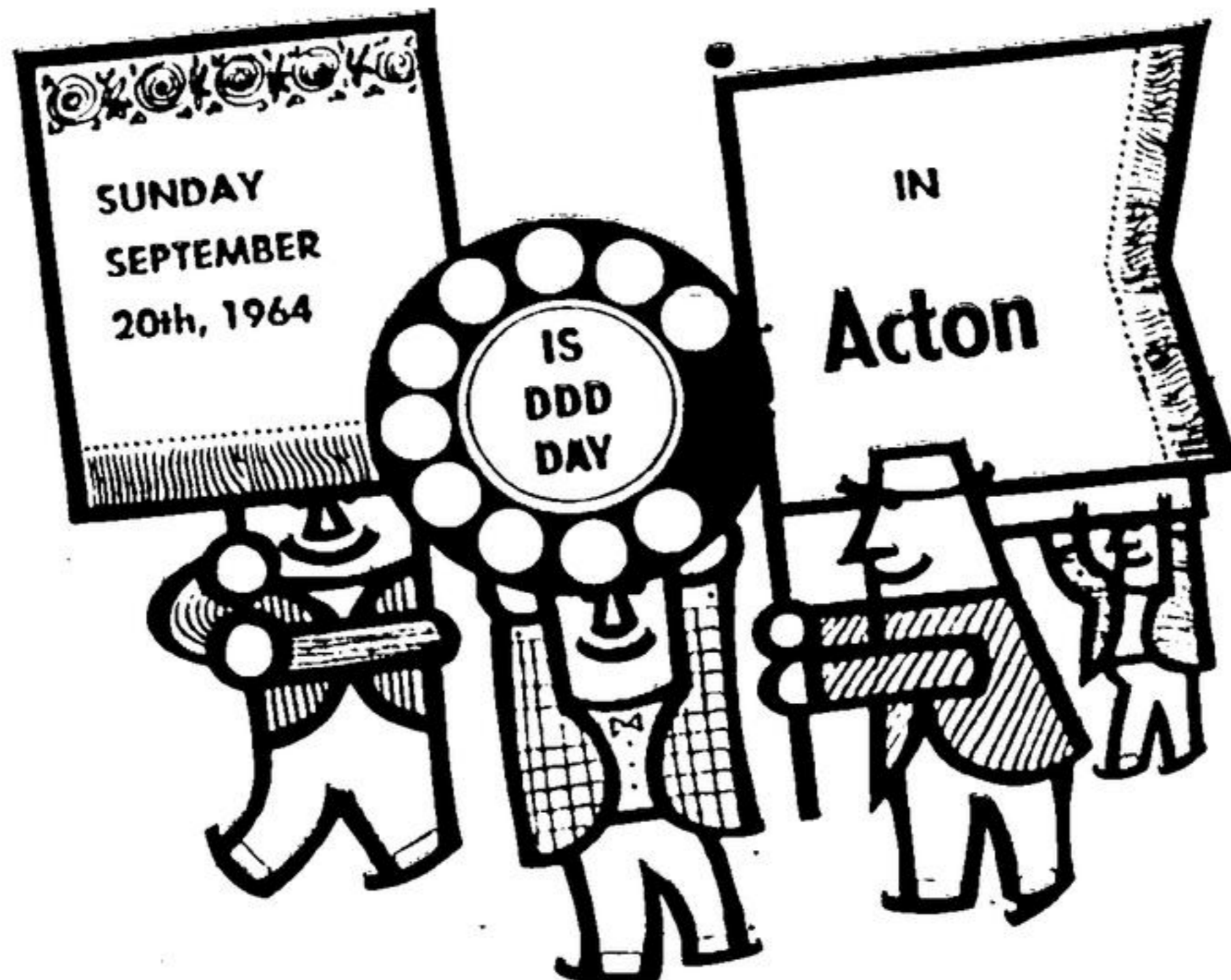

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First Aid

Once again St. John Ambulance is holding a First Aid course in your area. This is a wonderful opportunity for men and women to obtain valuable information to assist them to live, work and play safely, and to know the right thing to do when an emergency arises.

The course normally consists of two hours a night, one night a week for seven weeks, with the examination on the eighth night. Successful candidates will receive the St. John Ambulance Senior First Aid Certificate at the next higher award to which they are entitled. This is the Certificate recognized by the Workmen's Compensation Board. The total cost of the course is \$5.00 per candidate. This class will be held at the Town Hall, Willow St. North, Acton, beginning on Thursday, October 8, 8.00 p.m.
