## Dinner, Grandstand 23 Halton 4-H Members Compete at Exhibition

Twenty-three Halton 4-H Club members took part in the annual C.N.E. judging competition. Two hundred and eighty contestants from 12 counties surrounding Toronto, competed in this competition, held on Friday, September 4.

Members competed in two divisions. There were 166 contestants in the junior division for 4-H and Junior Farmers from 15 to 17 years, and there were 114 contestants in the senior division for those 18 to 26 years old.

The competition was divided into four sections — one on livestock, one on field and horticultural crops, one on farm engineering, and a championship class for proficiency in the other three classes.

In the junior livestock section, Carol Swackhamer, Acton, R. R. 2, stood fifth. In the junior field and horticultural crops, Carol Swackhamer, R. R. 2, and Wayne Atken, Acton, R. R. 1, tied for first; John McGee, Norval, R. R. 1, stood third, and Margaret King, Milton, R. R. 4, stood fifth.

In the senior field and horticultural crops, Art Lawson, Milton, R. R. 5, stood eighth.

In the junior farm engineering class, Lorne Ella, Hornby, R. R. 1, stood 12th. In the senior farm engineering class, Art Lawson, Milton, R. R. 5, stood fourth.

In the championship class for high score in the other three sections, in the junior division, John McGee stood fourth and Carol Swackhamer, ninth. In the senior championship class, Art Lawson stood fourth.

## "Transition" is Theme Farm Radio Forum 25 Years Old

National Farm Radio Forum celebrates its 25th birthday this year with a long look at agriculture in the sixties.

"Farmers in Transition", the theme for 1964-65, covers the spectrum of change affecting the farmer. From the opening topic on November 2 entitled "The Price of Life" and examining the question of medical care and costs, to the final topic in March, "New Patterns for the Land," Farm Forum critically and objectively views the new rural society.

**Sunday Farmer**  
Of major interest, on November 9, is "The Sunday Farmer", a look at the effect of part-time farmers on Canada's economy. "Farmers in Transition" on November 16 is a look at automation and its promise in agriculture. "Two Roads to Market" on November 30 examines the conflict between co-ops and marketing boards when the two handle the same commodity in the same area.

"The Outsiders", on January 4 will document the life of rural youngsters deprived of education and opportunity of income, location and perspective. "The Farmers' Image" on January 11, tries to get behind the stereotyped farmer to see what Canadian people think farmers are like in 1965. "The Split personality of

Farm Organization" on January 18 looks at the policy differences between the Federation of Agriculture and the Farm Union and assesses the likelihood of union.

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**Who can apply:** Any Canadian citizen, or anyone resident in Canada for one year who intends to live in Canada after completion of studies, may apply for a loan under the Act. An applicant must be enrolled or intend to enroll as a full-time student at an educational institution approved by provincial authorities, and must meet the standards of academic qualification and financial need established by the student loan authority in the Province in which he applies.

**Amount of loans:** Depending upon individual circumstances and financial need, loans up to \$1,000 a year may be made, with a maximum of \$5,000 during a student's academic career. The Provincial Authority receiving applications and determining eligibility will issue a certificate to each eligible student stating the maximum amount the student may borrow. This Certificate of Eligibility is required before a student can arrange a Government Guaranteed Student Loan with the bank of his choice.

**Repayment: Interest-Free and Delayed Repayment Period**  
To assist students, the interest on loans during the period a student continues full-time studies, and for six months thereafter, will be paid by the Government of Canada. During this same period no repayment of principal is required, nor will any service charge or fee be payable by the student.

**Method of Repayment**  
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**Where to apply:** A list of approved educational institutions in Ontario is contained in a brochure now available at banks, universities and other educational institutions. Ontario residents planning to attend one of these institutions should apply directly to that institution for a Certificate of Eligibility.

Ontario residents planning to study in other provinces or countries should direct enquiries to Department of University Affairs, Suite 600, 344 Bloor Street West, Toronto.
