Centre Inn-Ohsweken Finals To Determine Ontario Champs

Rockwood — The Centre Inn Softball Club returned from Ohsweken Monday night singing "Ten little, nine little, eight little Indians" mile after dusty mile. The catchy tune revealed to all listeners along the home-ward route that many of the burly braves had fallen prey to the pitching genius of John Salmon.

The game, the second of the O.H.S.A. finals, was "do or die" for Centre Inn. The decisive 7-1 defeat which they handed the skillful Indians forces the final game to be played Saturday, September 19 in Eden Mills park at 8.30 p.m. The winner of this game will be crowned Ontario Champions for the 1964-65 season.

The Centre Inn club defeated two strong teams in the semifinals, Bookton and Goodwood, losing only one game of five played. The first game of the finals ended in a 12-9 decision for the Ohsweken Braves in a loosely played contest.

The Monday game, however, was indeed a paradox with an errorless game on the part of the local club. Coupled with a

barriage of hits in the third inning, Centre Inn had little trouble handling the Indians. Perhaps the best pitching performance of the season was turned in by John Salmon.

The loud bats of the Braves were silenced as Salmon's pitches danced the confusing pattern so dreaded by even the best batters.

The final game this Saturday should be a thriller with an Ontario Championship on the line.
