#### Veterun Sulky Driver Killed at Raceway

Halton County coroner Dr. G. E. Syer has called an inquest for Monday, following the death of veteran sulky driver Wilbert Hopkins of Milton who was killed in a four horse pileup at Mohawk Raceway on Saturday evening. The 56-year-old native of Saskatchewan suffer for Station Hotel in the first ed skull and nack fractures and internal injuries when he was tossed from his sulky while driving Armbro Eclipse in the sixth race Saturday. Mr. Hopkins, who lived in a trailer at the Milton fair

grounds with his wife, worked with trotters for several area owners and also trained Canadian Intrusion, a notable winner, for the Mackinnon Brothers of Owen Sound. He was driving Armbro Eclipse in the eigh race when his sulky collided with the cart of Lynden Alex whose horse had broken and then sprawled on the track. Witnesses sald Mr.

Hopkin was tossed from his cart and landed on his head. The horses were approaching the stretch when Lynden Alex, driven by Almer Holmes, went into a break and stumbled. Eagle Armbro, following closely behind, crashed into the fallen cart and Armbro driver Harold McKinley was tossed toward the middle of the track.

This is the first fatality at Mohawk since it opened last year. A crowd of 5,467 witnessed the fatality on Saturday, forcluding Mr. Hopkins' wife,
