Name John Root Vice-Chairman Of Water Resources Commission

John H. H. Root, M.P.P., a former minister without portfolio in the cabinet of former Ontario Prime Minister Leslie M. Frost, Q.C., has been named vice-chairman of the Ontario Water Resources Commission and was sworn in on September 23.

Mr. Root, M.P.P. for Wellington Dufferin, has been a member of the Commission since November, 1961. He is often, and with good reason, referred to as Mr. Rural Ontario.

With his brother, James Root, he operates a 60-acre farm in Erin Township in the County of Wellington, where he was born. The brothers also operate a farm trucking service dealing in cattle and livestock.

He gained municipal experience as a school trustee and entered the Provincial Legislature in 1951 when he won the Wellington North seat from a Liberal opponent after three previous unsuccessful attempts, one of those defeats being by only 24 votes.

At the time the 1955 election came up the riding name had been changed through redistribution to Wellington Dufferin and Mr. Root was again successful. He repeated in 1959 and again in 1963.

In 1958, Mr. Root was elected president of the Baptist Convention of Ontario and Quebec, the highest open to a layman in the Baptist communion.

Fond of music, Mr. Root was musical director in the local church and has done considerable singing both as a soloist and with a quartet. He was a member of one of the local bands. He is married to the former Miss Lillian Mathilda Loup of Almonte. They have five children, one daughter and four sons.

Farm Knowledge

In the legislature Mr. Root is respected as an authority on agriculture and also municipal affairs. Quiet and unassuming, he is liked and respected by his colleagues. His intimate knowledge of farm and municipal problems ensures that his voice is listened to with respect.

This is the first time the Commission has had a vice-chairman and Mr. Root's appointment indicates the importance the Ontario government is placing on the OWRRC program. Ontario Hydro is another government commission which has a member of the legislature as vice-chairman.

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W. J. L. Hampshire Has 92 Birthday



W. J. L. (Bill) Hampshire, former Halton County school trustee, active church worker, Federal election candidate, amateur boxer and noted public speaker, celebrated his 92nd birthday on Monday at his R.R. 3 Milton home. Mr. Hampshire, who is deeply involved in Halton County history, is still enjoying excellent health.

"I have no recipe for living to a good age," he reports, "unless it's doing a good hard day's work." He admits he has smoked since the age of 16 and still enjoys a pipe. Mr. Hampshire was born at Fergus and at the age of seven months his family moved to Speyside where his father had purchased a 200-acre farm. Ten acres of the farm had been cleared and the other 190 was covered with virgin White Pine. Clearing the farm was the first task of the family and many years later, another 170 acres had been cleared.

Educated at Dufferin School at Speyside, he later served 30 years as a trustee of the school, as well as a period as school caretaker. He spent seven years on the county council. He is the oldest living member of Boston Presbyterian Church, has held church membership since 1888, taught an adult Bible class for 26 years, was Sunday school superintendent for 25 years and served as church manager for several years.

In 1935 Mr. Hampshire became Sheriff, Surrogate, Court Registrar and Local Registrar of Deeds for the County of Halton, posts that he continued to hold until 1946. A long time supporter of the liberal party, Mr. Hampshire was a candidate for the 1926 Federal election but was beaten by Dr. R. E. Anderson, his Conservative opponent.

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BATS Not in Belfry New Anglican Group

There are BATS at the Anglican church — but not in the belfry. BATS is the name of an older young people's group, now reorganized Sunday by former members of Luxton Young People's Association. The group's name is the Brotherhood of Anglican Teenagers — shortened to BATS.


