Foundation to Preserve History Credit Authority Recommendation

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority is investigating the setting up of a foundation similar to that utilized by Metropolitan Toronto and Region Conservation Authority, under which it operates the Black Creek Area (Pioneer Village) and the Abion Hills Conservation School.

"We know there are many things worth preserving in the Credit River Watershed," R. F. Hardy said in giving his report at the September meeting of the CVCA. "This can be done as we see it if we have Foundation money to spend." Mr. Hardy is chairman of the Historical Records Advisory Board of the Authority. Members agreed wholeheartedly with the report and appointed Mr. Hardy and Authority chairman Roy McMillan as a committee to work with the solutions in getting the Foundation organized.

Donations, either in money, property or equipment, Mr. Hardy said, will be deductible for income tax purposes when the Foundation is properly set up. He said that he had been in contact with several firms, both local and national in scope, and all had assured him of their intense interest and of cooperation financially in the venture.

In concluding his report, Mr. Hardy said it is the hope of the committee to have the Foundation in operation this year to the point where donations may be accepted from the 1964 income.

Flood Control Plan

"Everything we are doing or plan to do in the future hinges on the reply from Ottawa re the Flood Control and Water Conservation Plan," R. R. Parker said. Mr. Parker is chairman of the Flood Control and Pollution Advisory Board of the Authority. The five and a half million dollar plan is still awaiting approval from the Federal Government and after many months, members are understandably concerned at the delay.

The financing of the plan will necessarily have to be divided according to past conservation agreements: 37 1/2 per cent Federal, 37 1/2 per cent Provincial and 25 per cent Municipal. Early in 1963, a committee of the Authority received formal approval of the Plan from the 16 municipalities and verbal approval from the Provincial Department responsible but since that time, bureaucratic red tape in Ottawa has held up this most important and essential program.

It was decided appropriate members of parliament be contacted again and, at the discretion of the committee, a meeting in Ottawa be arranged in an effort to expedite the Plan.

Starved for Funds

In explaining the purpose of a foundation, Mr. Hardy said that donations from corporations and individuals could be accepted and grants from organizations who have funds for use on projects the Authority may plan to undertake. Under the present setup, donations may not be accepted from any source.

"We know the province does not give grants for matters of historical nature," he continued, and they are the judges of what is or is not in the field of grants. The Historical Records Advisory Board is starved for funds, because we get no grants and it would not be fair to expend large sums of taxpayers' money for these projects."

Conservation Film

Leon V. Hristow introduced Wes Fountain, who gave a talk on conservation and showed a film on the subject that had taken him three years to complete. It was mostly taken within a 10 mile radius of Acton. All Lions marvelled at the beauty present in this area. He is to come to the next meeting and show the remainder of the film "Leon Peter Papillon" thanked him.
