The dead man was a passenger in a car owned by David Varcoe. R. R. 2. Rockwood and driven by Patrick Churchill, & Longfield Road, Acton. Another paysenger in the vehicle, Donna; Kier, Acton, was unhurt.

The accident was reported to have happened around 1 a.m. Tuesday when the driver lost control on a curve on 22 Sideroad of Esquesing Township, approximately 4 miles east of No.


