## Tentative Approval Given Proposed Ajax Expansion

Application for an amendment to the official plan was authorized at Council meeting Tuesday when Mr. Don Wylie appeared at the meeting and requested a change in zone from R3 to M industrial on Lots eight, nine and ten of plan 670. The property is to the rear of the present Ajax Engineers-Marley Canadian property on Queen Street East. Mr. Wylie, as general manager, outlined the company's expansion plans to council. Expansion of the underused area of the plant would be 50 per cent and the additional land would be used for open storage of their products. He said the expansion program would be completed during the 1965 calendar year and would include new rail loading facilities and emphasized the desirability for early consideration.

Council agreed to make application for the necessary rezoning and will advise residents in the area of the changes. Mr. Wylie pointed out the company wished to be reasonable and would comply with the by-law in regard to rezoning and a planning strip. He reviewed the company's construction plan over the years and said the current project was part of an overall program.

Interim payment of the Department of Highways statutory grant in the amount of \$28,854.11 was applied for; \$17,882.67 for construction includes work on the two new culverts on Church and Bruck Streets; maintenance costs have been \$10,952.74.

The resignation of Wm. Sprout from Acton Library Board was received and accepted. Mr. Sprout and his family will be leaving Acton later this month.

The Clerk advised council that tenders have been called to be in October 29 at 5 p.m. on the rebuilding program on Queen and Young Streets. Number two committee will meet that night with the engineer and department representatives to see the tenders. A proclamation declaring October 15 as International Credit Union Day was authorized on the request of the local Credit Union.

Approval of the Department for an amendment to the official plan will be requested on the property at Main and River Streets to accommodate the new Acton Central Library.

After discussing the established meeting nights for council of the second and fourth Tuesdays, no change was made. Special meetings as required will continue to be at the call of the mayor.

Present for the midnight session which heard four delegates were: Mayor Doby, Reeve Hinton, Deputy Reeve Wood and council John Fryer, Irwin, Peal and A. Johnson.

"In particular, we honor the Order for its recognition that the best service developed for Canadians at home should also be offered to others beyond our shores and for demonstrating this belief in action for over 50 years."

## HARLEY...to HALTON

Since our last column the Farm Machinery Syndicate Bill has passed the House of Commons and now awaits only passage in the Senate and Royal Assent before becoming law. Despite many obstacles put in its path and many amendments proposed, it finally passed without change. I will not repeat details here as I have previously covered this in recent columns. I would be pleased to discuss this with any farmer in Halton who might be interested in this legislation where small farmers may join together to purchase machinery that is too expensive for them to purchase as an individual.

The Minister of Labour has introduced an Act respecting hours of work, minimum wages, annual vacations and holidays with pay in federal works, undertakings and businesses. This will be proceeded with at a date sometime in the near future. It applies, of course, to federal employees only, roughly 400,000 people. It is expected, however, to play a large part in influencing provincial governments to introduce similar legislation to affect the majority of Canadian workers. Generally speaking, hours of work are not to exceed eight hours a day and forty a week. Hours are to be scheduled so that one full day a week is free of work and wherever possible this free day shall be Sunday. Overtime shall be paid in excess of these hours, at one and one-half the regular rate (time and a half). An employer shall pay to each employee over 17 years of age not less one dollar and twenty-five cents an hour. Handicapped persons may, under special conditions, be paid less on authority of the Minister of Labour. A vacation with vacation pay shall be at least

two weeks after each completed year of employment. Employees will be paid for seven general holidays per year.

The remainder of the week has again been devoted to estimates of various government departments. One day was devoted to the case of Hal Hanks where the Department of Justice where he was completely inaccurate as the Minister's salary is paid under a special statute and the expenditures his amendment would reduce are pensions for the widows of judges.

## \$2,000 Grant - Briefs -

The Province of Ontario Council for the Arts has awarded the Five Counties Art Association a grant of \$2,000. \$1,000 is to be used towards the printing of the Associations bulletin and the remaining \$1,000 for conducting a Teachers' Council.

During the Association's annual meeting on October 3 it was ruled officially that the area covered by the Association shall include the counties of Wentworth and York as well as the former five counties of Waterloo, Wellington, Peel, Dufferin and Halton.

—Georgetown's population is now up to 11,379.

—Trial of Ronald McEchern, 23, Acton, is proceeding in Supreme Court in Guelph before Chief Justice G. A. Gale and a jury. A seven man grand jury, under foremanship of Ald. Albert J. Wells, returned a true bill of indictment against the accused, who is charged in connection with the death April 5 of Guelph Constable W. Eric MacAulay.

—Reports of hunters bagging moose in the north have been quite varied since their return. Only confirmed report was one of an Acton party bagging two bull moose in the north country. Some hunters are shying away from even telling their stories.

## STRAIGHT SHOOTING

Most hunters pride themselves on common sense and good sportsmanship. They do not abandon wounded animals, for example, nor do they expose other people to danger from their firearms. Yet every autumn, certain non-thinking individuals violate the code by taking chances that could just as effectively end in tragedy as if a random shot were taken into a family home. This type of person, perhaps disappointed at returning with an empty bag, relieves his frustration by taking pot shots at vital telephone cable. Eventually rain seeps into the damage, disrupting communications and leaving entire families — often in remote areas — without the protection of telephone service. Since this type of "hunter" never knows that a doctor or police or fireman couldn't be called in time because the telephone was out of order, his conscience never bothers him. Presumably if he took a pot shot through a window and scurried away, his conscience wouldn't bother him either.

## CIRCLES WORTH KNOWING ABOUT

Among important safety practices by telephone employees on and off the job is the "Circle of Safety," a habit encouraged in all drivers of telephone vehicles.

Before starting to drive, a telephone man walks completely around his car or truck to make sure no small child or inquisitive animal is under or even near it. He also checks for assorted toys, bicycles and other obstructions, open doors or improperly secured loads.

Another "circle of safety" is the dial on a bedside extension phone. It puts tire and police protection at your fingertips all through the night. And whether your bedroom is up stairs or down, a bedside extension saves steps day and night. Make yours a "Princess phone!" It's little...small enough for your night stand...it's lovely in appearance, and its built-in night-light means you can dial that call without switching on a lamp.
