At Council Meeting

Eramosa Centennial Approved Old School into Twp. Offices

Rockwood — The regular October meeting of the Eramosa Township Council was held in the Rockwood town hall recently. All the members were present and Reeve Cameron Lush presided. The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and adopted as read on a motion by Messrs. Cox and Smith.

A letter was read from the Department of Municipal Affairs, giving approval to the renovation of No. 10 School into a municipal office as a Centennial project.

The Ontario Municipal Board gave their approval of building and expenditures for the new Central School and for the passing of the debenture by-law.

Correspondence was also received from:

The following motions were passed:

New School
That By-law 12-1964 to authorize the borrowing of \$170,000 up on debentures for the construction of a seven room school plus a general purpose room in the township of Eramosa, be given a third reading and finally passed this 5th day of October, 1964.

That a By-law to name times and places for holding nominations and elections for reeve, deputy reeve, councillors and school board to serve during the year 1965, be given the necessary readings, passed and numbered 13-1964.

That the tax collector collect all tax arrears by whatever legal means deemed necessary. Carried.

The clerk and reeve were authorized to make application to the Department of Highways.

for the interim subsidy on road expenditure. Carried.

That the clerk be instructed to contact Mr. Guthrie of the Registry Office regarding information on property frozen in the township and also to advise about lifting restrictions. Carried.

That the building inspector be instructed to issue a building permit for the Eramosa Central School. Carried.

Accounts were passed amounting to \$5,331.46 (road accounts \$4,156.10 and general accounts \$975.36) for payment. Carried.

It was moved and carried that council adjourn to meet as a Court of Revision and general business on November 2 at 1 p.m., or at the call of the reeve.
