Grand Jury Inspects Buildings Suggests Several Small Changes

Grand Jury members were favorably impressed by the overall appearance and maintenance of the Halton County Administration Building when they inspected Halton County Buildings on Thursday. The jurors noted that the facilities are adequate for future expansion, but offered several suggestions for improving conditions.

Included in their suggestions were the following:

- Jury Rooms be soundproofed to avoid transmission of voice conversation to Witness Rooms.
- Jury Rooms be equipped with sun shades for comfort of jurors during prolonged considerations.
- Five doors presently propped open, be kept closed to fulfill proper function of alternate

Provincial Competition

Halton 4-H Members Compete

Halton 4-H Club Members made a very creditable showing in the Provincial 4-H Inter-Club Competitions at the University of Guelph, on Friday, October 16. Teams of two members judged four classes and answered questions on all phases of their 4-H project.

The Dairy competition was the largest, with 87 teams competing, and was won by Renfrew County with a score of 957 out of a possible 1,040. The East Halton 4-H Holstein Calf Club team of John McGee and Bruce Hart placed fourth, with 951 points, which was six points behind the winners. In eighth position was the Halton 4-H Jersey-Guernsey-Ayrshire Calf Club team of Carol Swackhamer and Margaret King. King had the highest team score in this competition for questions, scoring 229 out of a possible 240 points in this section. The East Halton team was just one point behind in questions.

In the beef division, with 42

teams competing, the winner also was Renfrew County, with 930 points. The Halton 4-H Beef Calf Club team of Larry Gardhouse and Margaret Hunter placed fourth, with 912 points.

In the grain division, with 24 teams competing, the Halton 4-H Grain Club placed second. Team members Arthur Lawson and Verne Thompson had a total score of 921 points, 39 points behind the winning team from Prince Edward County.

The Halton 4-H Tractor Maintenance Club team of Ken Wilson and Lloyd Zest was third out of 30 teams, in the Tractor section.

In the Field Crop section, with 25 teams competing, Lorne Ella and Don Featherstone representing the Halton 4-H Corn Club placed 23rd.
