Honors College Elizabeth Force

The following letter from Michigan State University was recently received by Principal E. A. Hansen of Acton District High School. Dear Principal:

You will be pleased to learn that Elizabeth J. Force, a graduate of Acton High School, has qualified to become a member of the Honors College at Michigan State University.

Membership in the Honors College is by invitation to the top academic achievers. I am sure that her excellent high school preparation helped her to qualify for entrance in the Honors College.

Dr. Idzerda described the Honors College at Michigan State University as a situation in which students of high ability are constantly challenged by the most advanced work for which each is ready. All students who have finished their freshman year at Michigan State with an "A minus" are given the option of entering the Honors College. Entry for the total number of hours, all course requirements for graduation are waived. Permission may be granted to take undergraduate or graduate courses regardless of the usual course prerequisites. In short, the students in the Honors College are allowed and encouraged to take more advanced work in their chosen field, or related fields, just as soon as they are ready for it.

Members of the College are granted graduate student privileges in the university library. When the baccalaureate degree is conferred, it will be noted in the diploma that the student is an Honors College graduate.

Assessment Up Esqueing Population 6,885

During 1964, the Esqueing assessment went over the ten million dollar mark. Assessment Commissioner Art Benton revealed to Esqueing Council last week. The assessment now is \$10,092,215, an increase of \$542,214 over last year, or an increase of 4.9 per cent.

The population too, has increased. It now stands at 6,885, an increase of 167 over last year.

An Esqueing becomes less rural as the percentage of farm land has decreased, there is 42.97% farm land, 37.01% residential, and 20.02% industrial and commercial.

Offer Grant A motion was passed allocating Esqueing's Centennial grant to Halton County for the Museum Board, since Esqueing plans no centennial project of their own.

"If we give it to the County it's fair," quipped Councillor G. Currie. "Everybody benefits, if we give it to one municipality the others would be mad," he added. Georgetown had asked that it receive it, if Esqueing was not using it.

At first Councillor W. Latham proposed dividing it three ways, between Acton, Milton and Georgetown, however, he finally agreed with Councillor Currie that allocating it to the County was the fairest method.

An unusual request from a Doverscourt Road, Toronto man provoked some discussion. He wanted to purchase rockery stone lying on the roadides in Esqueing.

"It's very honest anyway," commented councillor Currie. "Most just take it."

"If we legalize it by selling it," thought councillor H. Lawson, "then if it is left unsex, the rate payers will blame us."

After trying to contact Mr. Hulls by phone, and finding he was sick, Council decided to have both the Inspector and Mr. Miernina at their next meeting.

"It's only fair to hear the building inspector's side," commented councillor Latham.
