Ask \$2000 Bed Increase In County Hospital Grant

The Board of Governors of Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital, Burlington, submitted a brief to County Council on Thursday and requested an increased grant of \$2,000 per bed for a proposed 272 bed extension to present hospital facilities. The brief submitted by the Board of Governors stated "All of the existing hospital facilities in the County were built when the financial assistance given by the County amounted to \$4,000 per bed. Since then and despite the protest of the Halton Hospitals Council, the financial assistance figure has been limited to \$4,000 per bed.

The board of Governors stressed that Council should consider amending their present by-law so as to provide that grant assistance for hospital construction be restored to the rate of \$4,000 per active treatment bed. Council referred the matter to the Finance and Legislation and By-Laws Committees.

Presently there are 238 beds at the Joseph Brant Memorial Hospital and according to hospital estimates, by the end of 1964 there will be a need for 292 beds or 54 beds more than is present
