# Renovation of Rockwood Academy Is Possible Centennial Project

Rockwood — One of the main topics of interest brought up in the regular October meeting of Rockwood village trustees was that of renovation for the Rockwood Academy. The meeting was held in the town hall with all members present and Ken Murray in the chair.

The Ontario Federation of Teachers is considering two sites for their centennial project. Rockwood Academy has the inside advantage over its rival, the Newburgh College, because of the scenic surroundings in Rockwood.

They propose to renovate and refurbish the grounds and buildings, to make it a place where children and teachers will come and learn some of the history of education, as well as an added tourist attraction. Their choice must be made by the new year and it will depend on which village displays the most interest and willingness to co-operate.
