

Pounding the SPORTS BEAT

"THIS IS THE ONLY REAL amateur hockey" is the way Joe Milton, president of Orangeville Dufferins described W.O.A.A. action during last Friday's exhibition encounter with Orangeville. "My own son plays O.H.A. junior in Orangeville but I prefer to watch the intermediates. It's better hockey and the boys are playing strictly for the fun of it."

For the close to 400 fans who sat in on the contest Friday let me say a brief Amen. Most of them were out to see what kind of a team would be wearing Tannet colors this season. The game meant nothing to either club but the way both teams went at it hammer and tongs Friday, for two periods, would never have guessed it.

Both clubs settled down in the third stanza, sticking to puck handling rather than manhandling. This might have been due in part to instruction from the bench. In a few of the brass from both clubs could be seen less injury weakening their own team before the season started.

According to the score board Orangeville was the game with a goal in the last minute of play. However, at least one of the Dufferins counters was scored after the bell signifying the end of the third period. This would have made the game a tie. Nobody was disposed to argue about it. The game was only an exhibition. Dufferins let the Tannets know they would be no pushovers this season. They let Ferguson know Monday night by beating them 7-1 in the league opener.

WHAT KIND OF A CLUB are the Tannets going to have this season? Several good hockey players from last year's club, Jim Casburn, Paul Barber, Ron McLean and Norm Love have either retired or moved elsewhere. They left some gaping holes to plug. From the looks of the team's potential in Friday's exhibition the holes have been plugged with some success. Blake Inglis played centre in a way which reminds you a lot of Bob Dobbie of Ferguson. Wayne Davison and Bob Sales both turned in good performances. Jerry Inglis, Blake's brother, was away on a hunting trip so his defence post was divided up amongst the other blue liners.

Several of the veteran Tannets are not in shape yet. They have two away games before they make their next appearance here. By that time the team should be in better shape.

Elmira Polar Kings will be the first visitors here a week from Friday. The Kings played in the O.H.A. last season and reports indicate they have a pretty fair club.

This was obvious to the 350 fans who watched Dufferins score a goal in the last minute of play Friday night in the community centre, to take home a 9-8 exhibition win over the Tannets. Proceeds from the contest went to the new floor in the community centre.

Blow Lead
The Tannets blew a 6-1 lead to the victors in the final chapter of the rugged, free-scoring contest which saw 18 penalties trouping to the sin bin and one expulsion. Defense was forgotten in the last period as Orangeville netted in six goals to the Tannets' two. Acton outscored Dufferins 4-1 in the second period with both teams matching a pair in the initial stanza.

For the Tannets winger Don McKenzie notched a hat trick and picked up an assist to collect four points. 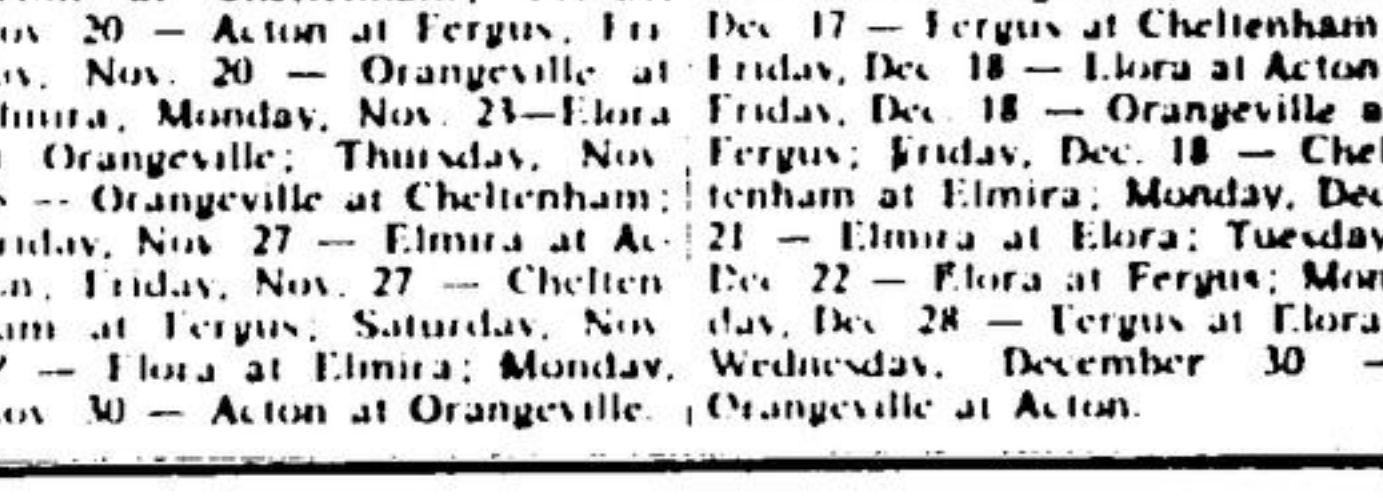
