

Nassagaweya Nominations Interesting At Least 10 Seeking Council Seats

Probably the most interesting nomination meeting in the history of Nassagaweya Township is shaping up for Monday evening, since 10 Township residents have already indicated that they will seek the few available positions on Township council. After months of wrangling between council and the Centennial Committee, the Ontario Municipal Board recently approved requests by council to go ahead with the construction of a new Township Hall.

Billed by the decision of the O.M.B. and stirred by the "many inadequacies of the present council," Township residents are expected to attend the nomination meeting at the Township Hall in Brookville and name a record number for Council positions. All present members of council have stated they will again seek positions and unanimously stated, "under the conditions there is nothing else we can do." Present council members are Reeve Bill Coulter, Deputy Reeve Dr. B. D. Young and councillors Allan Parsons, William Mahon and Ross Gordon.

Race for Reeve

Former Township Reeve J. Robertson who ran for reeve last year and was defeated by Mr. Coulter has stated, "I'm interested in the position and I think I'll run for it."

Mrs. Maurice Newton of RR 1 Campbellville, the most out-

spoken critic of the present council, reported, "I am going to seek a position on council because many of my fellow townspeople have expressed the hope that I would do so." Mrs. Newton was chairman of the Nassagaweya Women's Centennial Committee.

Campbellville resident Gordon Agnew who joined the Women's Centennial Committee in its place, has expressed the hope that he hopes to gain a position on the Township council as a councilor.

Nominations for Reeve, Deputy Reeve and three councilors for the municipality and for five trustees for the Township School Area will be accepted at the nomination meeting which is slated to begin at 7:30 p.m. Monday at the Township Hall. Township Clerk Calvin McIntyre has stated that \$30.00 will be the deposit fee for nominations.

County Promises Change In Grants to Hospitals

Tracting top specialists.

Reeve C. A. Martin acknowledged he was glad to hear Burlington was interested in county participation in hospital construction. "I fought for four years to get the county to participate and Burlington was the stumbling block," he said.

Committee chairman Herb Merry agreed the committee would definitely study some changes in the county grant by law as promised in the committee report. He expressed the hope it would be dealt with by the 1964 council rather than referring it to a new council.

Deputy Reeve Rogers, Burlington, pointed out Burlington's population had increased 10,000 in the past two years and construction must take into consideration future growth. He suggested that Oakville had received grants of \$4,000 per bed even though they still have empty beds.

Empty Beds

Reeve H. Merry admitted the Oakville hospital might have empty beds in some areas but in many sections there was no surplus of accommodation.

Warden G. Gallagher pointed out none of the hospitals in the county had been constructed under the present \$4,000 per bed county grant or under the clause relating beds to population.

Reeve H. Hinton, Acton pointed out that Acton does not benefit at all from the hospital grants and would be in complete disagreement with increasing them. He called for a review by the finance committee of the relationship of noncounty to county patients in the Oakville and Burlington hospital. He conceded the Ontario Hospital Commission might not be concerned about the municipal boundaries but suggested it would be interesting for county taxpayers.

Despite expressed misgivings we can't get staff, that will be impossible," Dr. Bull cautioned.

In the summer the County authorized advertising for public health nurses at a minimum salary of \$4,500. The new schedule sets the minimum at \$4,300.

Deputy Reeve Wood, Acton pointed out the Health Unit was supposed to have 25 nurses and presently only had 19. He also noted the Unit was without sanitary inspectors.

Dr. Bull told members of council he was concerned about the image of County Council after approving a resolution earlier this year setting salaries at one time and altering it now before the year begins. "If you find that decision was an unwise one changing it now will create an unfavorable image."

Consumers in Ontario, Quebec and the Atlantic provinces who have purchased KLIK since September 14th and who are in possession of any tins bearing these codes are asked to immediately return them to their retailers for replacement or refund.

Tins embossed with EST 7A, EST 7B, or EST 7D are not involved as they were produced at other plants and are in no way affected.

The recall of these tins is a precautionary measure which has been taken because spice units, supplied to the Company and used in the production of KLIK Luncheon Meat at one plant, contained less than the normal quantities of one of the curing ingredients.

The effect of a smaller than normal quantity of this curing ingredient has not been clearly established by food scientists. KLIK is cooked during the canning process, however, curing ingredients are added in the spice mixture to assure its long-term keeping qualities.

The best scientific opinion indicates that the risk of impaired keeping qualities is small, but may exist. Therefore, there is a small chance that the product could deteriorate and might then cause serious illness if eaten.

All KLIK presently on retailers' shelves has been carefully checked by company employees to ensure that it is not from the lots in question.
