## County Council Briefs

During the regular meeting of Halton County Council at County Administration Building in Milton on Tuesday, County Councilors:

- Learned that Halton County Children's Aid Society had 162 children in care as of September 30 of this year as compared to 99 children in care for the same month in 1963. Society received 63 requests for service during September 1964 compared to 65 requests during September 1963.

- Hear that two public health nurses have been hired by the Halton County Health Unit bringing the total number of nurses on the staff to 19 as of December 1. It was also pointed out there should be 25 nurses to make the staff meet the population ratio in the county.

- Agreed to ask tenders for the construction of the entrance way, foundation and electrical work for the new greenhouse to be constructed at the Halton Centennial Manor.

- Accepted the tender of Smids Construction for the building of a \$9,926 bridge at the Keho Dam. A contract was awarded to Albrecht Bros. of Kitchener in the sum of \$20,000 to supply and deliver reinforcing steel for the bridge. The Albrecht tender was higher than one other bid but the Kitchener company promised to deliver within six days.

- McDonald Welding of Oakville the lowest of two bidders was awarded the contract to supply and deliver steel posts and panels for the same bridge.

- Council approved payment of the following road rebates: Acton \$4,644.60; Burlington \$40,594.13; Georgetown \$10,210.00; Milton \$5,624.20 and Oakville \$46,461.24.

- Granted permission in the Roads Department an increase in wages of 10 cents per hour effective January 1, 1965.

- Received copies of the attorney's fees for a two year term.

- Retained a letter from the attorney of Bruce Miller who is requesting payment for damages to his trout pond as a result of wood spraying operations in 1963.

- Approved a bylaw authorizing a speed limit of 35 mph on County Road 13 from a point of 1000 feet west of the westerly limit of the road allowance between Concessions 10 and 11 of St. James.

- Approved payment of account totaling \$9,300.59.
