**ARTHUR FIELD**, who has lived in Acton for the past seven years with his wife and family at 62 Longfield Rd., is a field representative for Shady's Aluminium, Toronto, and has served on council one term. He is a member of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 197, Acton.

**MRS. DORIS FRYER** has lived in Acton for the past 43 years with her husband and has six children. She is a charter member of Acton Parks Board, serving for six years with the board. She is a member of Acton Women's Institute and was president for six years. During her first term on council last year, she promoted the Golden Age Club and has been named as the chairwoman of the executive. She is a member of St. Alban's Church and says, "I feel there should be a woman representative on council as it is a good thing to have a woman's viewpoint on civic matters."

**ALBERT IRWIN**, who with his wife and four children lives at 212 Macdonald Blvd., is a member of the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch 197, Acton and served on council from 1952 to 1955. He served again in 1963 and is in charge of the executive. **DR. F. C. OAKES** first took municipal office 25 years ago when he was elected to the school board. He served for 13 consecutive years, acting as chairman for four years. The last two years, he served on the newly formed Recreation Commission. He says, "If the ratepayers believe my years of experience in various municipal offices is worthy of consideration, I am willing to serve again."

**YELFORD REIDY**, who lives with his wife and two children at 11 Young St., was born and raised in Huron County in Huron County and moved to Acton in 1941. He is employed as a truck driver for the County of Hutton and during the war, served with the Canadian Army overseas. He is an elder in Trinity United Church. He says, "If elected, my main aim would be to encourage new industry to town in order to provide more job opportunities with a result of additional housing in town."

**A. L. RIEMER** is married and with his wife and three children resides at 74 Cook St. He has lived in Acton for the past eight years and operates an electrical, plumbing and heating business. **JOHN SHADBOLE** has lived in Acton for the past five years with his wife and two children at 143 74th Ave. He is the Ontario representative for a Montreal electrical manufacturer and is entering local politics for the first time. If elected, I will try my utmost to fulfill this intention and also try to provide more and improved recreation facilities for both young and old."

**WILLIAM (BILL) WILLIAMS** lives at 48 Mowbray Place with his wife and two boys and is employed at Ontario Steel Co., Milton. He is a past member of the Acton Fire Department, having served for 10 years. The past two years, he was deputy fire chief. He says, "Having been re-nominated for council, I will try my best to serve the community to the best of my ability if elected."

**FOR SCHOOL BOARD**  
Four candidates are running for three seats on the public school board this year.

**C. R. BISHOP**, candidate for school board for the first time, lives at 150 Wynford Place with his wife and two children and is employed as an aircraft inspector

or at De Havilland. He says, "I feel it is up to every citizen to allow his name to stand for municipal office once nominated and as a parent and taxpayer, I am willing to do my best for the education of all children if elected to office."

**ORVAL CHAPMAN**, a resident of Acton since 1951, lives at 66 Nelson Ct. with his wife and one daughter. He is plant superintendent at A. P. Green Firebrick Co. and a member of the Acton Chamber of Commerce. This is his first try for school board and he says, "It is my opinion every citizen should be willing to serve their community and if elected, I will attempt to uphold the high standard of education presently enjoyed."

**THOMAS DE VRIES**, 31, lives with his wife Jane and three children at 148 Longfield Rd. He has lived there over five years. He is a member of the Beth-El Christian Reformed Church for which he organized four highly successful seasons of Vacation Bible School and was in charge of Sunday school and Bible classes. He is an oil manager in Oakville and a gold award member 1963-64 of the Oakville Jaycees. He led this club in winning the provincial and national awards for Brotherhood in 1964. He will bring to the office of public school trustee eight years of managerial experience, which he feels will be a real asset for the administrative end of the board's duties. He would like to see an eventual changeover from public and high school boards into an all elected Board of Education. "I would work towards an immediate replacement of a man of the same high calibre as Const. Ron Rupert who left town, for our Safety Council, who has done a tremendous job for the safety of our children. I also feel that the parents from the M. Z. Bennett school's pupils should have representation on the board and believe that they will vote to reach this equal representation. I further would like to work for the continuance of the high qualifications as we have in the present teaching staff. I pledge all my efforts to the parents and voters of Acton in fond memory of my father, who was a teacher for over 45 years."

**DOUGLAS MANNING** lives with his wife and son at 54 Mill St. and is completing his fifth year with the public school board. During his term, he has served as property chairman and chairman of the board. He operates an electrical appliance store and television repair business. Mr. Manning is interested in the betterment of education in Acton and says, "If elected, I will attempt to maintain the fine standards upheld throughout the past years."

## Boys' Rehabilitation Centre Provides Courses, Certificates

Dr. and Mrs. R. D. Buckner entertained a number of friends in their home on Saturday evening, November 21, when Major McCorquodale of the Salvation Army spoke of the work done at the House of Concord. This is a rehabilitation centre for boys between the ages of 16 and 21 who are on probation, mostly first offenders, and whose home background is not deemed suitable for them to live in during this period.

Major McCorquodale, a most entertaining and enlightening speaker, was introduced by Dr. Buckner, who has been doing voluntary psychiatric work each week at the House of Concord during the past five and a half years. Major McCorquodale spoke of the early trials and tribulations of this experiment and then of the way in which the House of Concord has grown.

Its aim is to equip these boys to be useful members of society and to this end has organized courses in the following subjects which are sponsored by the government — farm training, service station training, and kitchen helpers. When the boys graduate from these courses, they receive certificates. It has been found that the demand for boys that are trained has far exceeded the supply.

To illustrate the mental attitude of the boys at the time of their entering the home, Major McCorquodale showed a table full of weapons taken from the new arrivals. These varied from

knives to cothes to knives—a formidable display.

The talk was a revelation to all and Major McCorquodale was asked many questions. Mike Homer thanked the Major for his stimulating address.

As this was the annual meeting, Mrs. A. J. Buchanan presided for election of officers and Mrs. J. Dennis was acting secretary.

Mrs. Spielvogel has been president the past year which had been a very successful one and everyone worked in harmony. A motion was made that all accept their office for the coming year.

Mrs. Spielvogel felt she was unable to carry on for the new year. After much coaxing two of the faithful women who have served so well for many years were persuaded to serve as a partnership job. Mrs. A. M. McPherson and Mrs. F. J. McCutcheon will now be the chief co-leaders of this faithful group.
