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### Election in Eramosa Reeve by Acclamation

Rockwood — After a rather stormy session at Township hall on Friday several nominees had not yet qualified and remained in doubt until 9 p.m. on Saturday.

At that time the present reeve Cameron Lush was returned by acclamation. The position of deputy reeve is being sought by present holder Douglas Forsythe.

Fred Cox, township councillor and member of last year's council, and Ernest Bentham, who has served a period of 22 years, held the positions of councillor, deputy reeve and reeve, and after a short retirement is again in the running.

The only two who had qualified for councillor by Saturday evening were former reeve Joseph D. Oakley and another veteran councillor member David Stinson.

These two are now automatically elected to council while a further

nomination will need to be held to elect the third member. This date will be decided later.

In the evening the village trustees nominations were as follows:

Kenneth Murray, James Milne

and Robert Leslie from the present Board, and Lloyd Waddell who will also let his name stand for trustee.
