Election in Eramosa Reeve by Acclamation

Rockwood — After a rather stormy session of Township nomination on Friday several nominees had not yet qualified and remained in doubt until 9 p.m. on Saturday.

At that time the present reeve Cameron Eash was returned by acclamation. The position of deputy reeve is being sought by present holder Douglas Forsythe. Fred Cox, veteran councillor and member of last year's council, and Ernest Benham who has served a period of 22 years held the position of councillor, deputy reeve and reeve and after a short retirement is again in the running.

The only two who had qualified for councillor by Saturday evening were former reeve Joseph L. Oaks and another veteran councillor, David Storey. These two are now automatically elected to council while a fourth

nomination will need to be held to elect the third member. This date will be decided later.

In the evening the Village Trustee nominations were as follows: Kenneth Murray, James Milne and Robert Leslie from the present board, and Lloyd Waddell who will also let his name stand for trustee.
