Defer Appointing P.S. Board's Representative to H.S. Board

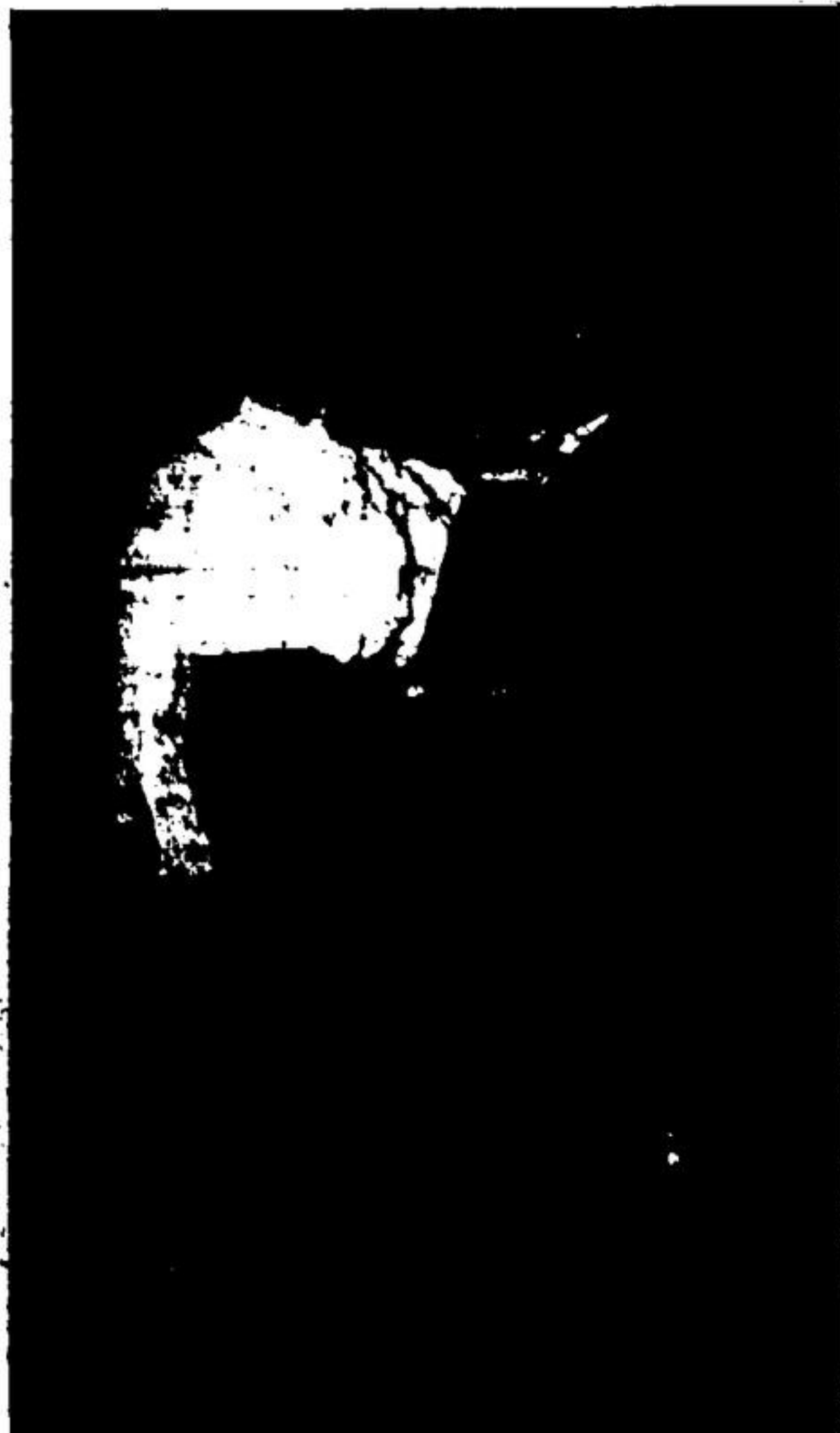
Appointment of a public school representative to the Acton District high school board was deferred to a special meeting on recommendation of teacher-management chairman Vic Bristow. This action was taken Tuesday evening of last week at the last regular meeting of the board for the year.

Mr. Bristow reported on a breakfast meeting held last Tuesday morning with a committee of council and board members prior to making the recommendation the appointment be deferred until a special meeting.

Support Reports
The teacher-management chairman also supports council's request for annual reports to rate-payers by appointed boards, specifically high school board. The district high school board comprises one appointee (Jack Reid) from the public school board, two appointees (Rev. Dwight Engel and Chester Anderson) from council, one (Duncan Moffat) from Nassagaweya council and one (Kerwin McPhail) from Esquimaux council.

Milton voters went to the polls Monday to cast ballots for one position only — that of a school board member. Only 7.4 per cent exercised their franchise to vote. Incumbent Ron Harris was returned to the board when he polled 80 votes. Opponent Geo. Jackson received 18 votes.
