HARLEY...to HALTON

On Friday the Amendment to the Justice Department estimates were voted on by the House of Commons. This amendment to a vote of confidence in the Government. After the widening of the terms of reference it was obvious that the Government was going to get the support of the three minor parties in the House of Commons.

This probably explains the poor vote the Conservatives mustered when it was called. The Conservatives, who proposed the vote, lost it 111 to 30. The remaining Government estimates were passed as this had been a prior agreement and the Government spending program has been approved until March, 1965.

We will not have to be concerned with interim supply as the Government now has the authority to pay its bills until the end of that time without further permission of Parliament. If the Government wishes to make any further expenditures not in the estimates and already approved, this will have to be done by supplementary estimates for House of Commons approval. I might mention here that the Budget for 1965 is being prepared by the Minister of Finance the Honorable Walter Gordon, and I would be very pleased to pass on to Mr. Gordon any representations of any of the Halton constituents regarding this matter.

It is a common hope that taxes will be reduced in 1965 - both personal and corporate. I feel we have a good chance of these hopes being realized.

As far as representation is concerned, the Representation Commission has announced the changes in numbers of Members of Parliament from each Province in keeping with the Electoral Boundaries Readjustment Act. These are as follows:

For instance as representation is to be by population some of the city ridings will disappear or become amalgamated and new ridings will emerge in the suburbs as the population moves away from the centre of the city to the outskirts.
