### Haltom's Health Good

#### Protective Measures Pay Off

Rigid protective measures by the Haltom County Health Unit are apparently paying off, according to a report submitted by the Assistant Medical Officer of Health Dr. L. M. Stuart, to the Haltom County Council. In his report Dr. Stuart noted, "It is gratifying to report that no cases of smallpox, whooping cough, lock jaw, diphtheria or polio have occurred in Haltom County this year. Protecting procedures administered by the Health Unit have increased by over 2,100 for an 11 month period in 1964 as compared to the same 11 month period in 1963. A detailed count of inoculations and vaccinations shows an increase of 2,150 over 10,429. The comparative figures were taken from the first 11 months of 1963 and the first 11 months of 1964.
