

Unbeaten Flyers Nail Down First

Unbeaten this season, Flyers consolidated their hold on first place in the Industrial Hockey League, Sunday, by bouncing third place Raiders 5-3. Cardinals sewed up the second slot with an 11-6 win over winless Riddulous in the second game of the double header.

Ken Tuck's hat trick, his first of this season, sparked Flyers to their win which they put on with a four goal flurry in the last 10 minutes of the period after Raiders had tied and went one up in the early minutes. The fly boys rained three pucks past Bob Sheppard in the front canto only to see Raiders bounce three of their own past Andy Williams in the second stanza and tie the count.

Tucks It In
Ken Tuck's unassisted tally put Flyers in front again but Raiders scored the first two goals of the third stanza before the winners came back with four straight markers.

Besides Tuck's three goals, Flyers got two goal performances from league leading scorer Wayne Sheppard and carrot-topped Harry Phillips. Gord Mason, who shares the leading scorer spot light with Wayne, putted the other marker while Dave Pamillon (3), Don Lindsay (3), Mason (2), Phillips (1) and Sheppard (1) collected assists.

Barry Incoce and Ron Sheppard bagged two goals apiece for the losers with Denny Gibbons rapping in the other. Assists were registered by Gibbons (2), Bruce Lambert (2), Ron Sheppard (1), and Doug Sheppard (1).

Only four minor penalties were handed out by referees Ches Pevcha and Bill Shannon, three of them to the losers.

Riddulous started out like they were going to bury Cardinals in the second game, scoring the first two goals, but Cards had a 4-2 lead at the end of the first period. They stretched it to 7-4 at the end of the second and added

four more in the third to Riddulous' two to win 11-6.

The hard luck team of the league it was Riddulous fifth loss in six games and it mired them deeper in the cellar. Cardinals, meanwhile, stayed in sole possession of second place, three points ahead of Raiders.

Keith Bags Five
Big gun for the Cards was pedagogue Keith Allen. He rattled five pucks into the net behind Clarence Sheppard in the Riddulous cage as well as assisting on one. Howard Dwyer and Jim McDonald each netted two goals. Bruce Barker and Bob Bruce netted one apiece. Dwyer also collected four assists. McDonald one as well as their pair of goals. Fred Hikoscu was in the brackets three times. Bob Bruce, Fred Currie and Tom Oakley one apiece.

For Riddulous Grant Withers and Don Sackhamer each try potted two goals while Jim Bulough and Elmer Andrews potted one each. Geoff McLaren racked up two assists. Jim Bulough, Chuck Davies, Frank Daley and Leon Duthill collected one apiece.

Although the teams settled down some from the previous night, officials Ches Pevcha and Fred Dunn handed out 10 penalties in the game, three of them to league bad boy John Cunningham.

Pounding the SPORTS BEAT

SMOOTH, GLISTENING ICE on Fairy Lake over last week and made a vast winter playground suitable for chummy, skating and ice skating. It proved to be a real attraction for the two former sports but there were no ice boats in evidence.

Conditions suitable for skating on the lake do not seem to occur as often now as they used to in the fuzzy checked scribble was a rosy checked mopple. In my younger days, much of the winter months were spent shovelling snow off what we called "the pond" in the vernacular, so the gang could play hockey. If the pond wasn't to our liking the filter beds were sure to be.

There was an assortment of filter beds at that time, most of them located behind Beardmore's. There were shallow ones, deep ones, tank ones, non-rank ones, and several dyed a dark red or brown. Depending on the weather conditions of the day we usually selected the one with the least snow on it for our games.

Unavoidably someone would skate on forbidden ice and get a dunking in the cold, cold water. If he didn't get in too far nobody paid much attention but if you went in up to your neck or over you at once became an object of concern.

There were two choices open to the victim. You could either sit beside the fire, which usually burned at the beds edge until both you and your clothes dried, or you could go home and confess to me and to that your liver's kicking on the forbidden beds. In the latter case you were sure a thumping was to follow whereas you might get away with it if you took the first choice.

It depended on which bed you fell into. If you happened to pick one which hadn't been used lately you didn't have a chance. As soon as you opened the door, ma would pick up her nose and sniff suspiciously. You made a hurried exit to hang your skates in the cellar, knees knocking and teeth chattering. Then you waited a decent interval before you ran the gauntlet to the bedroom where you hoped there was a fresh change of clothes.

The evening meal was the real test. Usually you wound up sitting beside the kid brother. You were no sooner seated than he pipes up, "I don't wanna sit beside Johnny. He smells." All eyes would rivet on you with Ma's faint suspicion turning into accusation.

YOU'D SQUIRM IN YOUR CHAIR, turn a bit red, look darts at Jimmy and hastily chortle. "It must be the cabbage. I think you burnt it Ma." That would be the last straw, your last blistering hope. A voice thundered at you from Mount Olympus. Jimmy Jones, were you playing on those filter beds again? Tell me how O.K. brother, ma, th." The kettle went onto the range and the wash boiler filled with water. The ice soap went into the galvanized bath tub. You suffered the indignity of either being pushed, shoved or capoled into what seemed like boiling hot water. Lathered and left to soak "until you smelled sweet again."

Most of those initiated in this way recovered. Some never ventured near the forbidden beds again but you could usually count on having enough players for a game when you made it there. In those days the filter beds were Acton's answer to hockey college. Many of the hockey skills were either learned or initiated into you on the colored water no matter what your rank.

Townley Scores Eight

Tanners Drop Rocks 15-4

Hottest stick in W.O.A.A. senior hockey last Friday night belonged to Harold Townley, left winger with Acton Tanners. The veteran marksman scored eight goals as the Tanners downed Elara Rocks 15-4 in a game which wasn't nearly as one-sided as the score would indicate.

Long a fixture at or near the top of both team and league scoring, Townley had collected only five scoring points in eight games up until Friday, consisting of one goal and four assists. Over the last two of the smallest crowds of the season, saw No. 8 equal the number he wears by netting a goal in the final second of the first stanza, bag all Acton's four second period goals and add the final three in a seven goal third.

McKenzie Buzz Saw
It was the hottest night in Acton sport ever had in the lamp lighting department. Noting Townley's up on six of the goals was Donny McKenzie, the buzz saw from Hillgrove who's a going concern whenever he steps on the ice.

Captain Max Stafford, Blake Ingrie, Wayne Davidson, Larry Tuck, Fred Keane, playing coach James Beaumont, and rookie Johnny Dunn fired a goal apiece around out the Acton victory, the Tanners' sixth in nine games. Final game of the schedule's first half puts the Tanners against the undefeated Orangeville Dufferins next Wednesday here.

Elara made Friday's game interesting until the start of the third period when they began to run out of legs. A young inexperienced club, they could neither cope with the heavier Acton club nor match their experience.

Will In Second
The Tanners grabbed a 4-1 first period lead but with it in the early minutes of the second as the Elara forwards put two past Sweney in the Acton nets, to make it 4-1. One of the Rocks' goals was scored while they played short-handed. Then Harold Townley's range cannonade from the blue line made it 5-1 and less than a minute later he had knocked it another in. The Rocks' period number at 15:00 but that was the end for them. From that point it was all Tanners and Townley's.

Jim Keating, one of the better rearmen in the league never had a chance on the shots that beat him. He turned aside many lapping drives but the incessant firing wore him down.

The game was blighted by poor refereeing. A bout of first cuts between Acton's Bobby Marshall and Drome of the visitors could have been avoided in the dingy minutes of the contest if the officials had been on their toes. As it was they lalled out 15 penalties, including a 10 minute misconduct to Gerry Ingrie of the Tanners and two fives for fighting.
