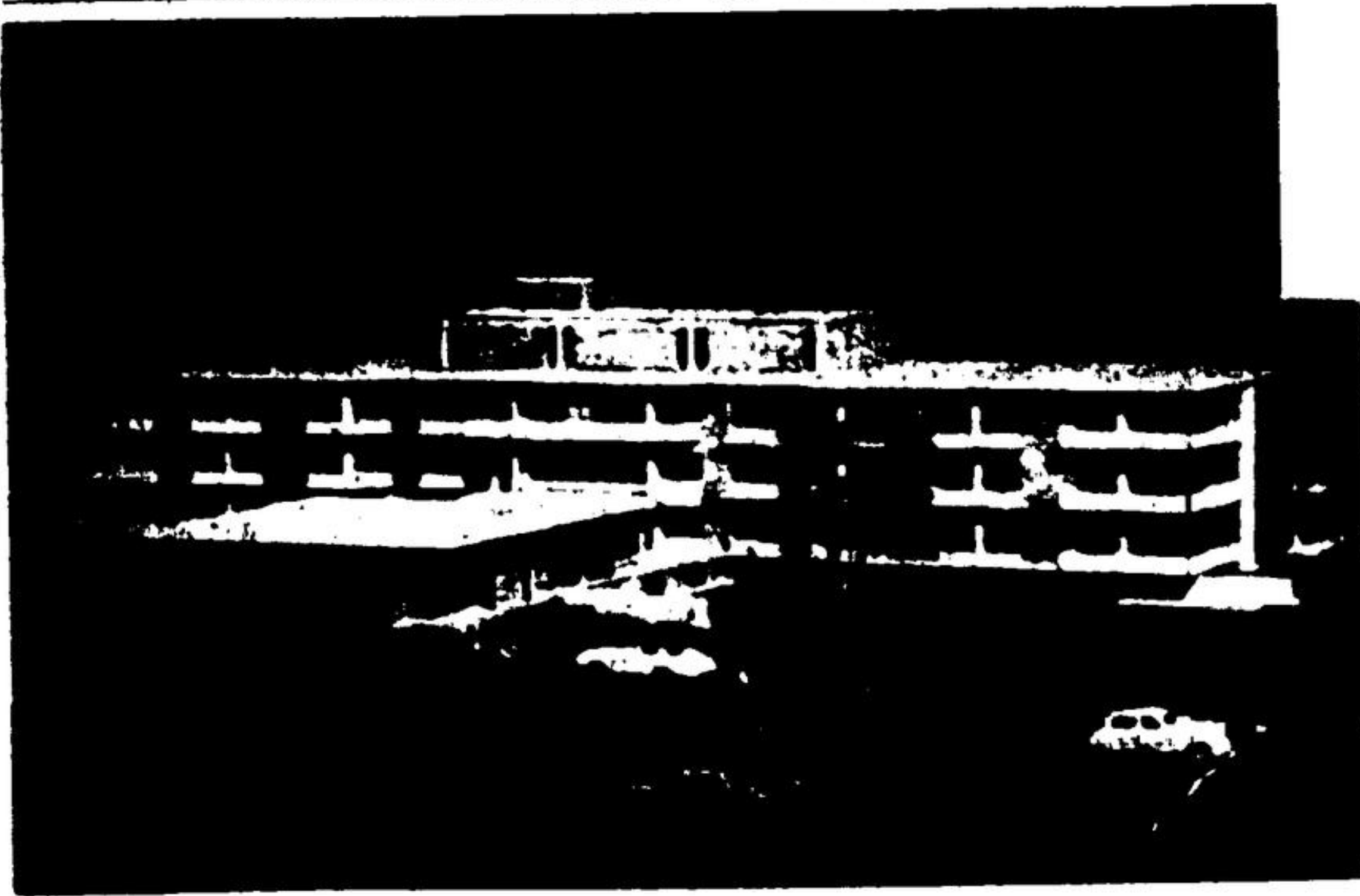

**EXPANSION OF HALL-TON'S** home for the aged facilities was as shown when Halton County Council approved plans for the second phase, a 150 bed, three-storey structure. Architect Donald Skinner's revised scale model is shown here. The project is estimated to cost \$1,600,000 and will be erected adjacent to the present Manor on Ontario St. & Allison. The home will be completed in 1965 and will be ready for use late in the year. Plans call for a 150 bed home with the addition of 150 beds provided for at a later date. The present Manor capacity of 225 beds will be greatly increased by the new home.

The present day was selected as a means of unifying the observance of Christmas, the mass of Christ.

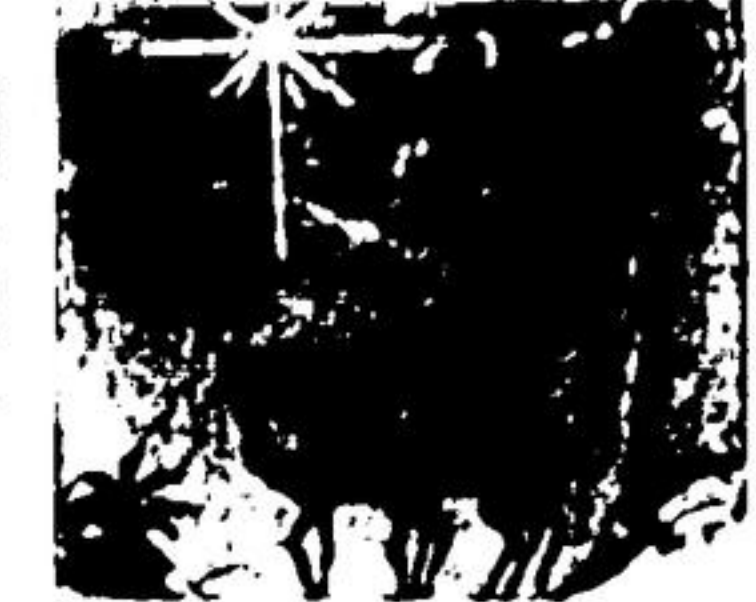
Plans were made for the annual Christmas services and the decorating of the church for the occasion. New members were selected and plans for instruction periods were discussed.

## Ice Your Cake For Freshness

Christmas cakes are not at all ways need say the food experts at Macdonald Institute, Guelph, but almond paste and icing will help to preserve the cake and add a decorative touch.

A glaze may be used instead of a frosting. To do this, brush the baked cake with one part slightly beaten egg white to three parts of water, or with one part of sweet table molasses to four parts water. Return the cake to the oven for a few minutes to set the glaze.

If almond paste is used, it should be rolled to half an inch thickness and made the same shape as the cake. The cake is then brushed with one slightly beaten egg white and two table spoons of water mixed together. Before the almond paste is patted into place, 24 hours should elapse before the icing is applied.

Whisk 1 pound of shelled almonds, put through a grinder and work to a paste. Add 4 un-beaten egg yolks, 1 teaspoon rose water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and gradually knead in 1 pound of icing sugar until smooth. More sugar may be added if needed.

**To Make Ornamental Frosting**  
Put 4 un-beaten egg whites into a large bowl. Sift in 1 pound of icing sugar and beat vigorously with a wooden spoon. Add 1 tablespoon of lemon juice and beat until the icing holds its shape well. More sugar may be required. This icing is suitable for decorating with a pastry tube.
