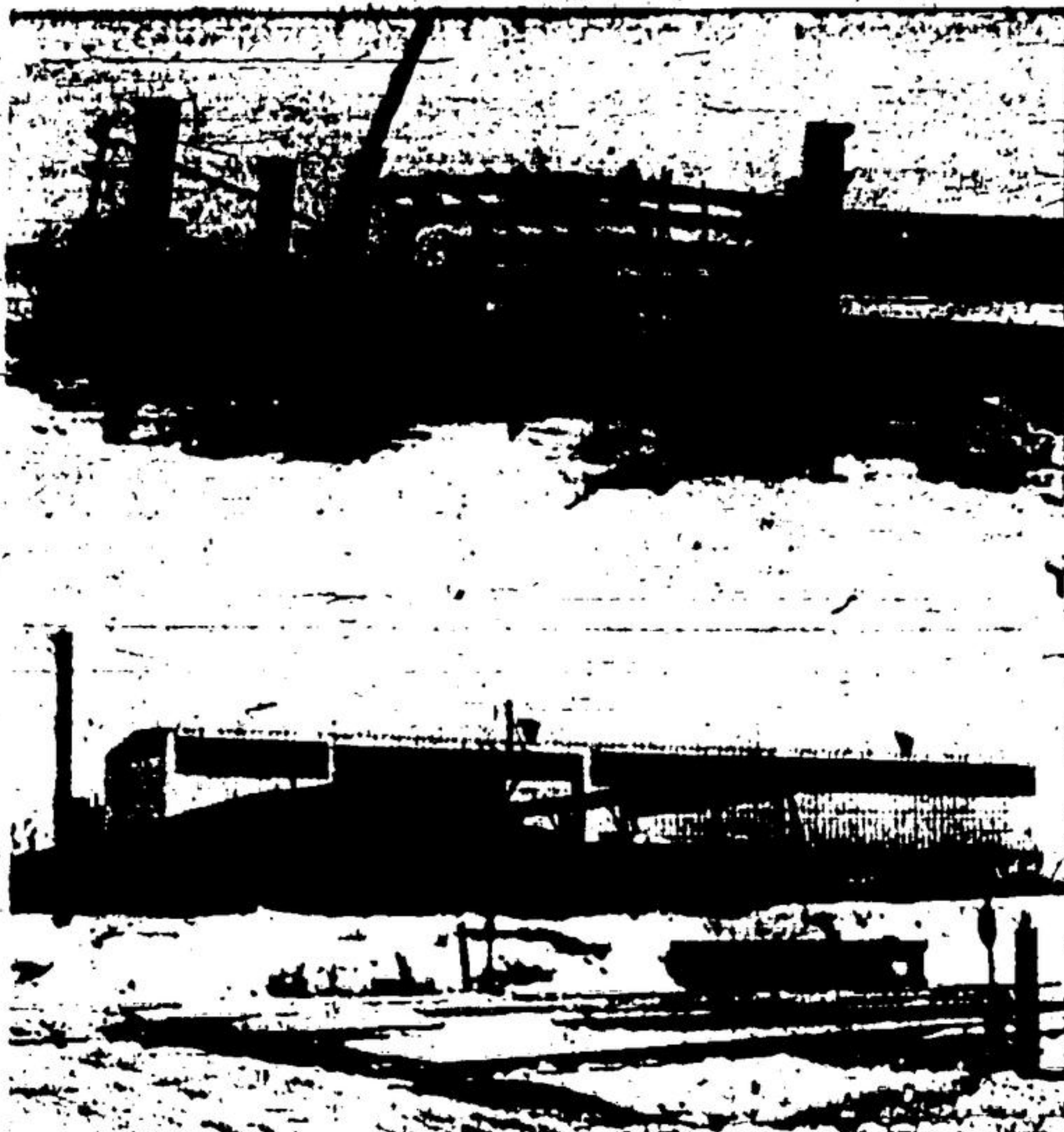

Cherbourg, Caen, Caudebec, Falaise, Paris are liberated. Canadian return, this time victorious, to the beaches of Dieppe.
