

The Canada at War series, sponsored by Dow, returns this coming Monday evening, January 11 at 8:30 p.m. with the showing of films eight and nine. A short course follows.

8. **New Directions** Dec. 1943-June 1944. Canada, war season, puds for the final assault. In London, Prime Ministers met and Mackenzie King holds out for Canadian independence in foreign policy. To the Arctic, Canadian ships sail the Murmansk run with supplies for beleaguered Russia. The Italian campaign intensifies; Canadians cross the Gustav and Adolph Hitler lines. In the south of England the Allies poised for attack.

9. **The Norman Summer** June September 1944-D Day, June 6th, 1944. In early morning hours, in forty carriers, including 110 ships of the Royal Canadian Navy, cross a section, pitching sea to the coast of France, while Allied air forces pound enemy positions from the air. Cherbourg, Caen, Crippeau, Falaise, Paris are liberated. Canadians return this time victorious to the beaches of Dieppe.
