Empty School Bus, Two Cars Collide in Dense Fog Friday

Dense fog last Friday kept Milton O.P.P. officers on the go from early morning until late afternoon investigating accidents. Acton O.P.P. constable Bruce Kressler assisted in investigating a three vehicle collision involving an Esquexing school bus owned by Clarence Denny, R. R. 2, Acton, driven by Mrs. Gloria Douglas, R. R. 4, Acton, a station wagon driven by David Gow, Guelph and a car driven by Harry Rungling, Brampton, until Milton O.P.P. arrived at the scene. There were no pupils in the bus at the time.

The accident occurred in dense fog at the corner of No. 7 Highway and the fifth line of Esquexing.

Damage to the school bus, which had just dropped off pupils at the Linehouse school and was proceeding to pick up pupils for Speyside school, amounted to \$200 while damage to the Gow vehicle was estimated at \$700 and the Rungling car at \$250. No one was injured.

First word of the accident was relayed to Constable Kressler by a passing motorist and he immediately radioed Milton O.P.P. constable Ron Hudd who investigated the accident. Constable Kressler drove to the scene, laid out flares to warn oncoming traffic and directed traffic until the arrival of Constable Hudd.

Government Approves Assistance Manor Expansion, Pumphouse

Two Halton County projects recently received approval and assistance from the provincial government. George Kerr, M.P.P., announced.

A commitment to make a loan has been approved in respect to the construction of a 150 bed-care home for the aged in Milton and alterations to the present Halton Centennial Manor. The new bed-

care unit is to be a three-storey brick construction, adjacent to the present home.

The total cost is \$1,473,273, with a Provincial Loan of \$736,636 which is 50 per cent of the estimated cost of the project.

Construction is to commence immediately and is scheduled to be completed early in 1966.

Mr. Kerr pointed out that the work was completed by April 1, 1966, the province would forgive 25 per cent of the loan.

The second project receiving Provincial assistance is also in the Milton area.

A commitment has been made for the construction of a town of Milton pumphouse at Kelso Dam Site, Township of Nassagaweya. This work is to include miscellaneous piping, electrical controls and wet well with 50,000 gallon capacity.

The total cost of the project is \$56,000 and the amount of the loan is \$37,333.

Mr. Kerr indicated that construction would commence on this project immediately and it is expected to be completed early in 1965.
