Tyler Rink Cops Trophy

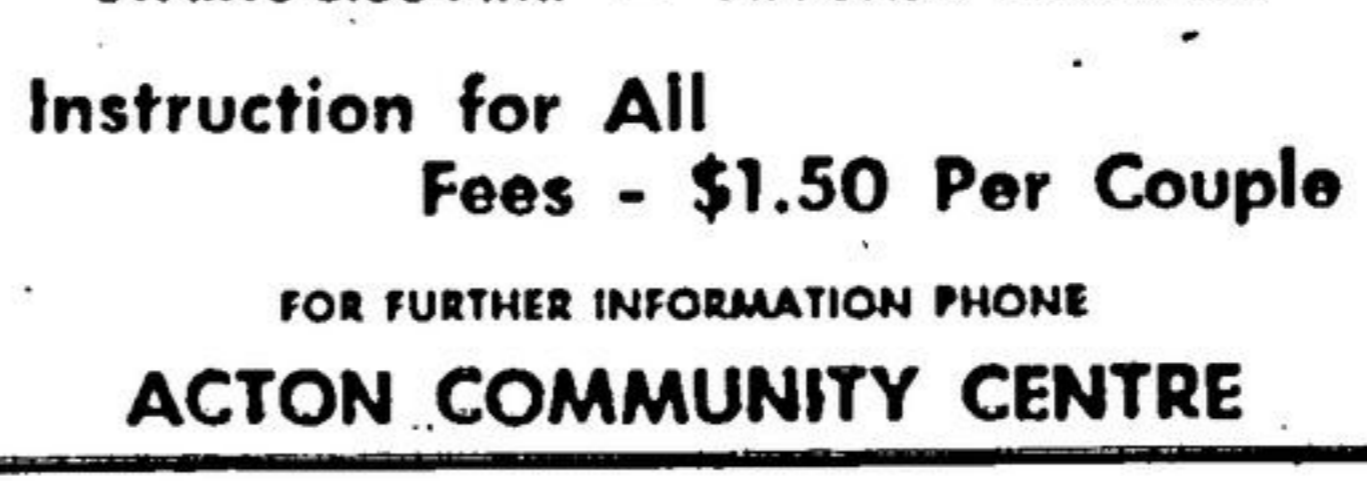

Salary Cost \$25,500 190 County Meetings

How much time does the administration of Halton County business take, and what does it cost the taxpayers?

Well, there were approximately 190 meetings of County Council and its several committees during 1964, and the cost to Councilors' wages and expenses came to approximately \$25,500.

Halton Treasurer-Mike Maxted said her figures on wages and travelling expenses are not quite complete yet, but figures to date came to \$25,454. Councilors are paid \$30 per meeting of Council of committees, plus mileage. They do not live in Milton and must travel to the court house for sessions.

The meetings included those attended by the 14 councilors, plus those conducted by the Mayor, Board, Museum Board, Board of Health and Children's Aid Society.
