Corn on each of these farms was planted at three dates from early May to early June.

At Brock Harris's, corn planted on May It vielded 10.6 ton of silage, or 3.7 tons of dry matter peracre. Corn planted on June 9 gave 15 ton of silage, but only 3.33 tons of dry matter per acre. The early planted corn had almost 5 tons less water per acre, with a higher total dev matter content In terms of bushels of grain corn! per acre, the early planted yield ed 75, and the late planting, 39

At Pete McCarthy's, the May 16 planting yielded 19.8 tons of silage, \$8 tons dix matter. The June 4 planting yielded 18.8 tons silage, and only 4.8 tons of dry matter. Comparative bushels of grain corn were 104, and 72.

Several farmers in Halton and throughout Ontario had difficulty in picking their grain corn last fall because of the high rainfall. in August, and delayed maturity of the corn.


