Four Fire Prevention Agencies Win Awards in N.F.P.A. Contest

Four fire prevention agencies in Halton County have been judged winners in the 1964 fire prevention competition sponsored by the National Fire Protection Association. It was announced today by M. S. Hurst, Ontario Fire Marshal.

The Oakville Plant of the Ford Motor Company placed second in the "Industrial" division for all entries in both Canada and United States. Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau, a group representing all five fire departments in Halton County, was named "Special Recognition" by the judges for an excellent standing county sponsored fire prevention program.

The Oakville Fire Department's entry won an Honorable Mention in both the all-Canada competition and in the Ontario competition, and Milton Fire Department received an Honorable Mention in both all-Canada and Ontario divisions of the contest.

It was the 34th annual contest sponsored by N.F.P.A. and 48 Canadian communities competed along with hundreds of entries from the United States. Each winner will receive a certificate through the Ontario Fire Marshal's office.

Entries constituted a scrap book account of the fire prevention bureau's 1964 activities.

W. Percy Brown Passes Former Acton Sportsman
W. Percy Brown, a former resident of Acton, died January 18 in Brandon, Manitoba. He was the son of the late James and Mary Brown of Collingwood and then Acton. He was 79 years of age.

Mr. Brown married Eva Simmons in Acton in 1907 and they lived on Bower Ave. before moving to Brandon in 1912 where they have lived since. He was employed by the Brandon Power Commission. In 1957 they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

He is survived by his wife, three sons, Gordon of Calgary, Arthur, Leamington and Jack, Vancouver, a daughter, Dorothy Hannay of Brandon, four grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, sister Miss Bertha Brown of Toronto, brother Roy and Erni of Toronto. He was predeceased by sister Miss Fern Brown of Acton, brothers Oscar of Vancouver, Fred of St. Thomas and Warren, killed in action in World War I.

Funeral service was in Brandon January 21.

In Acton Mr. Brown played hockey and baseball for town teams. He also enjoyed curling and lawn bowling. He belonged to the Oddfellows Lodge in Acton and Brandon.
