Guest speaker and "governor general" at the Model Parliament will be Charles Templeton.

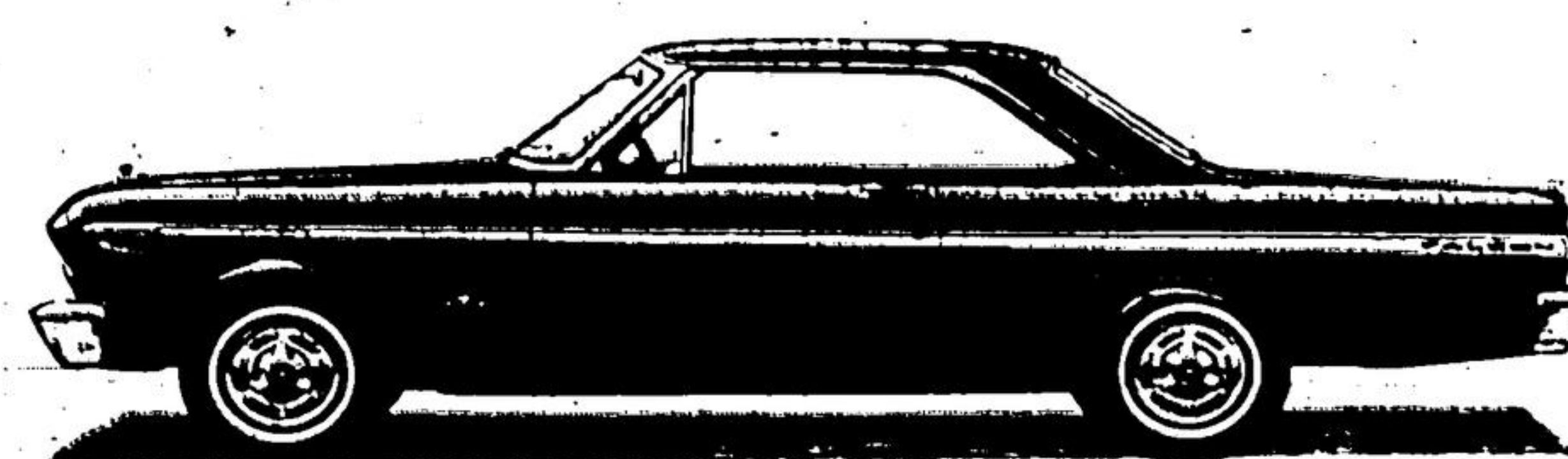
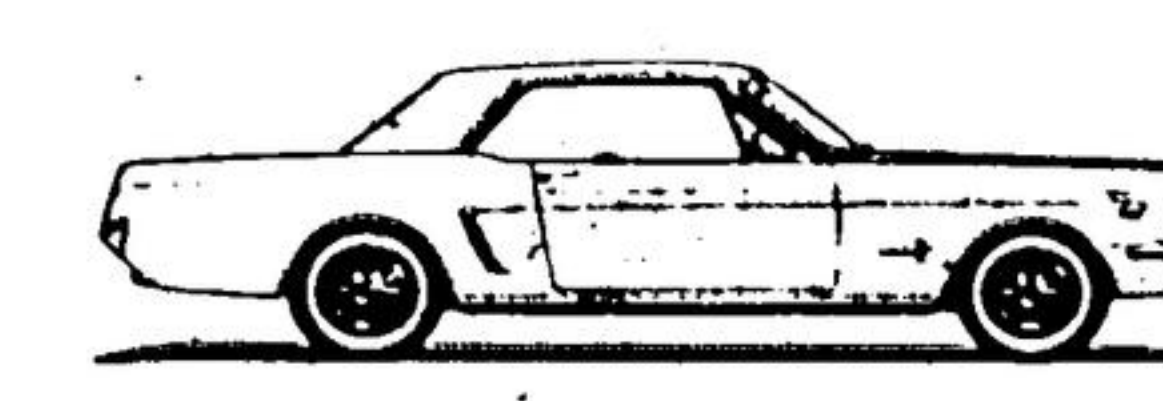
