South Towns Pay Major Share Toward 1965 Halton Tax Levy

Halton's two major shareholders, Oakville and Burlington, will be asked to pay \$3.86 per cent of the Halton County levy for 1965, it was learned this week.

Halton's Assessor Ford Rogers informed County Council the county has \$271,115,819 worth of taxable assessment, according to the 1964 equalization by-law.

The basis on which 1965 county tax levies will be figured was listed as follows: Acton, \$7,251,651 taxable assessment, 2.64 per cent of the levy; Burlington, \$186,152,149, for 3.71 per cent; Georgetown, \$15,861,686 for 3.79 per cent; Milton, \$8,973,781 for 3.27 per cent; Oakville, \$121,647,519 for 4.43 per cent; Esqueping, \$10,834,324 for 3.46 per cent; and Napaagaweya, \$4,273,625 for 1.56 per cent of the total.

His report noted the county's total assessment was \$274,154,335 in 1964; however the Ontario government owns \$1,230,748 worth of crown property and the Canadian Government \$857,756 worth, on which grants are paid in lieu of taxes.
