John Carter New Assessor, Collector of Eramosa Twp.

Rockwood — The regular February meeting of Eramosa Township Council was held in the Rockwood Town Hall recently with all members present and the reeve, Cameron Lush presiding. The minutes of the last meeting were read and adopted as read on a motion by Mr. Storey and Mr. Cox.

J. Carter, E. Gardiner, C. McDougall and R. Millson were interviewed by council for the position of assessor. After the respective merits of the applicants were discussed by council, the following resolution was passed: Moved by Messrs. Cox and Storey, that John Carter be engaged as assessor and collector of dog licenses for 1965, his salary to be \$2,000 and 25 per cent of the dog licenses collected.

M. Storey advised council of the dangerous conditions on the county road near him and council assured him it would be brought to the county's attention. Ken Murray, chairman of the Village Trustees, Rockwood, brought to council's attention building lots available in the village for erection of the municipal office. He also would like to have council making the assessment in the village \$100 per lot.

The following motions were passed and carried by council: It was moved by Messrs. McKenzie and Oakes that a by-law be passed requiring buildings and yards to be put in a safe condition to guard against fire or other dangerous risk or accident, be given the necessary readings, passed and numbered 51905.

Moved by Messrs. Storey and Cox, that a by-law to permit the encroachment of a building on part of Christie Street in the police village of Rockwood, be given necessary readings, passed and numbered 61985.

Messrs. Oakes and McKenzie moved that the treasurer's bond for \$5,000 be accepted as is.

Fly Inspector
Councillors Storey and Oakes moved that Clifford Duffield be reappointed Warble Fly Inspector under the Warble Fly Control Act. His remuneration to be \$1.35 per hour plus 10c per mile travelled, and that Mr. Duffield be authorized to purchase powder where it is most advantageous to the township.

Moved by Messrs. Storey and Oakes that council respectfully accept the resignation of Cusker Wheeler as a member of the Eramosa Township Planning Board and take this opportunity of thanking him for his valuable and faithful service during his term of office. Moved by Messrs. Storey and Cox, that Elmer Allan be appointed to the Planning Board for the years 1965, 1966 and 1967, and Archie Lowe be appointed to the Planning Board for the years 1966, 1967 and 1968.

Renovate Park
Members of the Eramosa Community Club interviewed council with regard to financial and mechanical assistance in renovating the Rockwood Park for softball and community recreation. The township agreed to give them the utmost co-operation. Messrs. Lush and Cox were named as members of the committee.

Several items of correspondence were discussed. An appeal for assistance from the Muscular Dystrophy Association, Department of Tourism and Information on Centennial Planning, assistance for the Salvation Army, Ontario Teachers' Federation regarding council's cooperation in regard to the federal grant visit.

A letter from the Ontario School Trustees in regard to a convention, the Royal City Ambulance regarding a county meeting, from Hungerford and Guthrie on by-laws to guard against fire and accident and building encroachments and from the Canadian National Railway's regarding advising council of no land for sale.

Councillors Oakes and McKenzie moved that this council agree to purchase from the Underwood Co., a brand new typewriter at a 10 per cent discount or a satisfactory agreement with the clerk.

Reject Academy

A letter had been received from Miss Dorothy Martin of the Ontario Teachers' Federation, to the effect that the Rockwood Academy had been rejected by the Board of Directors of the O.T.F. as a Centennial Project, and thanking the Home and School for its support.

Word was received from Toronto Home and School headquarters, stating a vote was needed by February 12 regarding their Centennial Project. The group voted in favor of a project to improve parents' knowledge of the importance of children's reading. Second choice was a museum of education, and third, travel grants for inter-scholar travel in Canada.

Recipe of the Month

PLUM ROLY POLY
Serves 8 For a Snack or Dessert

3 cups biscuit mix
2 tablespoons melted butter
1/4 cup sugar
2 teaspoons cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 cup canned strained plums (or junior plums)

Prepare your own biscuit dough or use a prepared mix. Roll out in 15 x 10 inch rectangle. Spread with melted butter. Combine sugar and spices. Sprinkle 1/2 on biscuit mix. Spread with strained plums leaving a 1-inch margin. Sprinkle with remaining sugar and spices. Roll up and cut in 1-inch slices. Place slices, cut side up, in a greased pan or muffin tin. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15-18 minutes.


