Duke of Devonshire Chapter Reports on 48th Active Year

The following is the forty-eighth annual report of the Duke of Devonshire Chapter, Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire, Aylmer, Ontario.

Through the year 1964-1965, there were ten regular meetings, and three executive meetings held in the members' homes. The membership is twenty-five, average attendance 16 and five members with perfect attendance.

The Standard was carried at all regular meetings, Decoration Day and Remembrance Day Services. The Standard was also displayed at the tea for New Canadian clas-

ses in basic English at the Action High School; and at the Treasure Mart.

The Regent presided at all meetings, and also attended an Anniversary dinner of a Georgetown Chapter.

A summary of the convenor's report is as follows: the Echoes Secretary reported all members receiving the magazine; get-well and sympathy cards were sent to members and former members' families and flowers to members who were ill or had suffered bereavement.

The convenor of Citizenship and

Immigration organized a tea for the students of the basic English class, assisted by 11 members. The chapter was honored to have one of its Charter members, Miss M. Z. Bennett, chosen as Action's Citizen of the Year.

Special Topics

Some of the topics given by the convenor of Empire and World Affairs and discussed by the members were: the Queen's visit to Charlottetown, Quebec and Ottawa in October; problems confronting the leaders and governments of the great nations of the world; the threats of wars in

Africa and Asia; the unrest in many parts of the world including the separatists in Quebec; the new Flag; the Canadian Medical Expedition to Easter Island.

The projects of the Education convenor and members included a visit to the two public schools on Empire Day, when each presented with a set of books for their libraries. The Regent attended the Grade Eight Graduation Banquet and presented pens to the student with the highest standing from each school.

Give Scholarship

She attended the Commencement

at the High School and presented a Scholarship to the student with the highest standing among the graduates.

Film highlights at one meeting were slides and commentary by Miss Nancy Held on her previous summer tour of Europe, where she attended summer school in Switzerland. At another meeting the members viewed slides and enjoyed the talk given by Mr. F. Harrop of Milton on his trip to South America.

One of the members showed slides of her recent trip to the west coast including Seattle and World Fair buildings. Films entitled "The Sceptre and the

Mace" and "The Song of Algon-

quin" were shown at the time of the Queen's Visit to Canada.

In the early spring, the Chapter members visited "The Weather-vane at Rockwood," an unique antique shop operated by Mr. Donald Stewart, and featuring woven coverlets, "Lion glass and furniture."

The Beardmore company invited the Chapter to tour the factory, and with our guests, the Lakeside members, we found it a most enlightening experience. The staff served refreshments afterwards.

Donation Gifts

The convenor of Services at Home and Abroad shipped a carton of infants' and children's wear, hospital gowns made from men's shirts, and quilts to Headquarters. Also several large car-

tons of used clothing were taken to places of need. Christmas gifts were wrapped and sent to residents of Haltom Manor, County Home for the Aged. A donation was given to the recently organized Senior Citizens' Club.

Other local donations were to the Halton Children's Aid, the Music Festival, the Decoration Day Committee, the Canadian Legion, and the Crippled Children's Fund. Donations to the National and Provincial Organizations were the Lucy Morrison Fund, Overseas Relief, Korean Project, Peace Garden, Film Fund, Commonwealth Fund, the Canadian Centenary Fund, and the Second War Memorial Fund.
