Four County Meetings Monthly Warden's Re-Organization Plan

The possibility of four county council meetings monthly and the abandonment of committee meetings was suggested Tuesday by Warden H. Merry when he asked a committee study of the plan of operation. The County Council presently meets only once a month regularly.

Warden Merry suggested it was difficult for members to be fully aware of what was going on in county government, other than through the minutes of the committee meetings.

He noted that county government was one of the oldest forms of government, and many of the systems have been carried over from year to year.

In calling for a review of the meeting schedule, the warden suggested the possibility of four county council meetings monthly with possibly two meetings in committee of the whole and two as council with no committee.

Persians Win Show Awards

Two championships were awarded to Persian cats owned by Mr. and Mrs. Eric Johnston at the American Cat Fanciers Association show Saturday and Sunday in Toronto.

A blue Persian, Wheeler Dealer of Halton Ridge, was judged best novice in the show and won the Dr. Ballantyne Trophy. This cat has previously been Grand Champion at the Cat Fanciers Association show, but this was the first time it was entered in the A.C.F.A.

Champion in the best open class was Henry VIII of Halton Ridge, a blue-eyed white male Persian.

Hoist New Canadian Flag In Colorful Ceremonies

Canada's new flag was raised at five places throughout town during the weekend. The red maple leaf on a white background with solid red borders at each end began waving in the breeze officially at 12 noon Monday.

Sunday afternoon, Mayor Les Duby and Legion president James Gunn quickly lowered the Red Ensign at the cenotaph and raised the new flag as a handful of Legionnaires and a few citizens watched. The ceremony was concluded Sunday since most Legionnaires would be working Monday, the official day for the flag raising.

Monday noon new flags were raised at Beardmore and Co. Ltd., the federal post office, M. Z. Bennett public school and the Acton district high school. Monday after lunch, the new flag was hoisted on the flagpole at the Robert Little public school following a brief but solemn outdoor ceremony. School boards had ordered the flags for the new national emblem.

Principal Elmor Smigle at the M. Z. Bennett school addressed pupils over the public address system prior to the noon break and stressed details of the new flag as he read the proclamation signed by Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson.

At the high school students assembled in the auditorium at 11:30 a.m. to hear the proclamation read and an explanation of the new flag made by principal E. A. Hansen.

At 12 o'clock noon caretakers at both these schools quietly raised the flags.

Public works custodian Cam Letham lowered the Red Ensign and raised the new flag at the post office at noon as four people stood by watching.

"The high school is looking forward to discovering talent hitherto unseen," says principal Ted Hansen. "It is well known that there is much talent hidden and often lost, particularly between teenage and later. This is a small attempt to bring to light some of that talent."

During the evening, Mrs. Hoey offered advice to students about their work.

It is hoped that there will be public support and appreciation of this endeavor as interest is vital — particularly to a beginner in art, Mr. Hansen said.

Over 1,300 fans jammed their way into the community centre Friday night to see the N.H.L. Oldtimers play an exhibition with Acton Tanners in aid of minor hockey. They were also entertained between periods by members of the Acton Figure Skating Club and an Atom contest as a curtain raiser to the evening. A check of tiles showed this was the largest crowd in the arena since the days when Acton Tanners filled the building in 1947.

Sponsored jointly by the Acton Minor Hockey Association and Legion minor hockey committee, the event was the most successful of three annual appearances of the N.H.L. Oldtimers here.

Minor hockey officials were elated at the support they received from the people of Acton and district.

An impressive and solemn ceremony took place at the Robert Little public school at 11:30 p.m. Monday when inspector R. L. McNeil handed over the new flag to members of the school safety patrol for raising on the standard.

Pupils circled the flagpole at the school and watched in silence as the Red Ensign was lowered by patrolman Leonard Van der Polder, told to the regular meeting of Council on Tuesday.
