Children's Aid Asks \$36,000 County Grant

"Your investment in the grant of \$36,000 to protect children in their own homes and prevent situations reaching the point where the child is neglected, pass tremendous dividends socially and economically to the community," D. V. Latimer, chairman of the Children's Aid Society, told Halton County Councilors Tuesday.

Mr. Latimer was presenting the annual budget of the Society with expenditures estimated at \$188,000. Of the total budget, \$132,000 is for child care services. A provisional grant of approximately \$36,000 is applied to the total \$96,000 required from the county.

Mr. Latimer reviewed that a comparison of costs to the county with 1961 showed a 32 per cent increase. "A figure not greatly over the population growth for the same period," he noted, however, that total costs showed an increase of better than 50 per cent. The explanation, he suggested, was in revenues from other sources.

The chairman termed the budget a realistic one and asked council's approval of the \$36,000 grant at the same level as last year.
